Councillor John Elliott Chairman of Urban Board

Councillor John Elliott, who headed the polls in the December elections, was elected chairman of North Halton Urban Board at a meeting in Milton last week.

The "unofficial" board, formed several years ago to discuss municipal problems of the three North Halton towns, plans monthly meetings this year, alternating between the towns. Next meeting is slated for April 8th, in Georgetown. At the inaugural meeting, dog control, industrial expansion and telephone wires on the discussion agenda.

Possibility of having a joint area cannot be considered at present, it was learned, because Acton has no dial telephone system.

An industrial commission for the three towns and two townships making up North Halton, was another subject explored. There will be no further discussion at the April meeting, and later Esqueping and Nasagaways will be asked for opinions on this.

Milton has agreed to a 30c per capita levy for dog control services by Oakville Humane Society, it was learned. Georgetown is talking at the increased levy and has offered a flat payment of \$1500 this year. Milton's fee amounts to \$1580, under the levy.
