



Thirty Old Masters from the great museums of Europe, insured for more than \$2,000,000, received back to V.I.P. treatment when they were transported to Ottawa from Montreal Airport and the port of New York for the inaugural exhibition in the new quarters of the National Gallery of Canada. Canadian National Express, which was responsible for the previous shipment, provided portable propane heaters which maintained an even temperature of 60 degrees in the trucks carrying the pictures from plane to train and from train to gallery. Careful guards kept watch every step of the way. The lower photograph shows a painting being unboxed from the express truck at the gallery. The picture being lifted from its crate in the upper photograph is "Portrait of a Man" by Caravaggio, lent by Naples. Superintendent of Monuments and Museums, Lucie Fortin, accompanied the shipment of art treasures from Italy. The Old Masters will be on public view until April 5.
