#### The Corporation of the Township of Trafalgar

#### By-Law No. 1960-21

A Bylaw to amend Bylaw 1958-48.

WHEREAS it is deemed desirable to amend the zoning Bylaw to provide for certain amendments to permit Religious and Educational Use;

#### AND WHEREAS the amendments hereinafter set out were recommended by the Board of the Township of Trafalgar on the 8th day of February, 1969 and the 17th day of September, 1969.

Now therefore the Council of the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Trafalgar enacts as follows:

1. That by-law No. 1958-48 being the zoning by-law of the northern area of this municipality, be and the same is hereby amended as follows:

(a) Following Subsection (1) of Section 1, the following section be added:

"(1) 'Educational Uses' shall mean academic schools offering courses of instruction equivalent to those customarily available in such schools under the jurisdiction of a public authority and shall include nursery schools";

(b) Section 5B (4) be deleted in detail and substitute therefore "churches, Sunday Schools and other places of worship with or without church hall and educational uses other than a trade school";

Read a first, second and third time this 8th day of February, AD, 1960.
