Christian Education is Speech Topic to BAC

Allan Weatherstone, prominent Anglican layman, was the guest speaker at dinner of the Brotherhood of Anglican Churchmen in St. George's parish hall last Wednesday.

A former school board chairman in Oakville, where he was prominent in St. Jude's Anglican Church, Mr. Weatherstone, who now lives in Toronto, spoke particularly about Christian education.

"We carefully choose our school teachers, do we do the same for church school teachers?" he asked, as he pointed to the church's need for more adequate instruction. He also called for reorganization of a church system which puts a rector in charge of a membership of four or five hundred people.

"Can you imagine any industry which would expect one man to look after all the details of such a large group?" he asked.

Mr. Weatherstone stressed every day Christianity in his talk, and wondered if people cannot successfully co-exist with their neighbours, how much more difficult it is for nations to do so.

Introduced by Ernie Barnas, chairman of the BAC, he was thanked for his talk by Wilfred Hibbins, Maurice Miller extended thanks to the daughters of the Church who catered for a roast beef dinner.

Rev. Kenneth Richardson and Grace and Rev. John Hathbone, Glen Williams, gave the benediction.

Other 46 mills should be added to all for debenture coats. This would average out about 5.3 mills for the three areas without the debenture coats.

"There will be arguments about this in the future," contended Councillor Linham "In fact," he said, looking over to the reporter, "they'll probably start right now."

It was decided to write the high school inspector for advice.

The Township road program for the year calls for an expenditure of \$78,000 — twenty-five thousand on construction, and fifty-three thousand on maintenance, according to the by-law submitted for subsidy purposes.

A letter was read from the Crown Attorney, P. K. McWilliams, asking municipalities to issue warnings of high water and swollen creeks, when the thaw sets in. He felt the danger should be publicized widely, and reminded council of the drowning of a little girl in Sixteen Mile Creek.

Council decided to go along with a request for lights at the Hornby Hall Park, as long as Esqueping's share does not exceed one thousand dollars.
