## Add One Policeman Okay 4% Pay Hike

Dealing with a brief from the Police Association and recommendations from the police chief, council on Monday endorsed a 4% salary increase for all members of the police department and decided to add one man to the force.

Newest member of the force, Ron Rankine was elevated to first class constable and policemen will now be given a \$300 daily payment for off-duty court appearances. Establishment of a 5-year service bar was also okayed.

The police association had asked an 18% increase and Chief Haley an increase to \$5,500 yearly.

No change was made in a requested reduction in duty hours from 44 to 40 hours weekly. Asking pay for working on statutory holidays, or an additional week's leave, the policemen were promised time off at a later date, and will be paid for holiday work on special occasions.

Turned down were requests for a \$50 annual clothing and phone grant, a pension plan, and requests of the chief for a radar speed timer, a new style police badge, and elevation of Cpl. Hilt-borrow to sergeant.

Further study will be given to request for a second police car, and a pension plan will hinge on whether council considers such a plan for all town employees.

Council decision was unanimous except for Cr. John Gunn who favoured a higher pay hike.

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## Mayor Hyde Is Opposed Need More Industrial Land

Against opposition of Mayor Hyde, who thinks more industrial land should be allocated, Moore Park subdivision made its first step towards building when council on Monday ordered preparation of a by-law amending the official plan to designate land use in the subdivision as industrial, commercial and residential from its present agricultural.

The matter has been before council for several months and was recently referred back to council's town planning committee which met with representatives of the Ontario Dept. of Planning last week. With that department and the town planning board still advising that Georgetown already has enough industrial land, a council majority favoured taking their advice.

Mayor Hyde claims there is valuable industrial land in the subdivision which will now be zoned as residential and green belt.

The Planning Dept. has admitted that they were wrong in some of their original reasons for declining more industrial land, but have come up with some new reasons which our local planning board ne-
