

Rumour Not True That Red Cross Sells Supplies

The position of the Red Cross in time of war has been clearly defined in an excerpt from the Charter of the Society and printed in the first article of this series — "To furnish volunteer aid to the sick and wounded armies in time of war."

Persistent rumours make the unfounded statement that Red Cross aid-articles during the First and Second World Wars Legion men who were "Prisoners of War or wounded" can meet the challenge of this statement. To them, in many cases, Red Cross was the only link with home through food parcels and comforts distributed by the Society. Red Cross is assigned responsibility for the men who are on leave. Doubtless, Red Cross articles were sold by unscrupulous persons but without the authority of the Society.

An interesting item in the Red Cross Blood Transfusion Service is the result of procuring blood from donors. In smaller branches holding only two cit-

rate a year, such as here in Georgetown, it is possible to collect blood for about 55¢ per bottle. Some of the larger branches collect 900 to 1,000 bottles of blood a year and the average cost is about 60¢. In large metropolitan centres where clinics are held every month, the average cost runs about \$1.00 per bottle.

The Blood Service is a costly undertaking and represents a large item in the yearly budget of the Georgetown Red Cross. The excellent facilities of Knox Church Hall will again be the headquarters for the next local Blood Clinic to be held on July 7th.

Spring floods are imminent in many parts of Ontario and the Canadian Red Cross Society is carrying on a continuous and vigorous campaign to prevent the needless loss of life in, on or near the water.

Through its national and international affiliations, the Red Cross knows no boundaries and every year hundreds of missing persons are located through

this little known Red Cross service.

The Enquiry Bureau also provides authentic information of victims' welfare when disaster strikes in any part of the world. This is also a free Red Cross Service.

Over the past three years, as many requests to help locate missing persons with connections in Georgetown, have gone through the files of the Georgetown Red Cross. In two cases the Branch was able to supply information to help trace the missing persons. A current list of persons being sought by relatives is posted in the Public Library and the Georgetown Post Office.

It is hoped that residents will bear in mind these many services carried on by the Canadian Red Cross Society. When the canvasser calls at your door on Thursday April 7th, any donation whether large or small, will assure that the Red Cross can carry on your financial support means that you join a fellowship dedicated to the relief of human suffering. It takes money and it takes people to carry on the extensive work of the Canadian Red Cross Society. Through your dollars, you are there, wherever and whenever the Red Cross serves. And because of the widespread volunteer assistance your money goes farther in the provision of help, hope and understanding.

He saw service overseas in the First War with the 5th Division Signals, and in World War Two as Commanding Officer of the 2nd Division Signals. He was a member of the Military Institute.

He leaves his wife, Margaret Hunter, a daughter, Mrs. Allan Austin of Toronto, and a sister, Mrs. S. H. Howard of Terra Cotta. Funeral services were conducted on Tuesday at the Morley S. Bedford Funeral Chapel, Toronto.
