Last Wednesday evening the CGIT and Explorers Groups of St. John's United Church became affiliated with the Women's Missionary Society.

Guests taking part in the service were Mrs. McDonald, of Cookville, presbyterial secretary of the WMS, Mrs. Walter Brownridge, president of the Afternoon Auxiliary, whose group sponsors the CGIT, Mrs. O. M. Brewster, president of the Evening Auxiliary who sponsors the Explorers, Mrs. McCurdy, Explorer presbyterial secretary from Streetsville, was unable to attend.

The CGIT and Explorers presented separate token gifts to the WMS president, to be used for medical work, vocational schools for girls in Angola, where they learn cooking, sewing, knitting, gardening, bible lessons and graduates return to their villages to be Christian leaders. Means School is a residential school for senior public school and girls attend CGIT groups there too.

The girls have completed World Friendship, a project on Angola. After viewing films and reading books, they learned many things about the African people, especially the need for more missionaries and supporting those already under many difficulties.

The CGIT was presented with a certificate of affiliation and world friendship insignia which is worn on the lower right arm. The circle signifies the world; the cross the gospel of Jesus Christ; the diamond the four-fold purpose of CGIT. The rays of light and waves symbolize the light of the gospel stretching from sea to sea.

Rev. Morgan McFarlane read the benediction and a lunch was served by the leaders of CGIT and Explorers, with the older girls serving.

Recover Stolen Goods Juveniles are Charged

A small gang of juveniles ranging in age from 11 to 14 were apprehended by police last week in connection with a rash of thefts perpetrated against stores in Georgetown and Brampton.

According to police, the gang, 8 in all, was also responsible for extensive milk bottle looting which took part on the night of Friday, March 18. They said the stolen property totalled an estimated \$400.

The roundup started Monday, March 21st when Constables Ron Rankine and Harley Lowe picked up two juveniles following a break and entry at Ernie's Hardware and TV store the previous weekend.

By Thursday the remaining six were apprehended.

Stolen property recovered included air rifles, hunting knives, transistor radios, jewellery, pens and pencils, records, fishing tackle, watches, etc. and in most cases the victimized storekeepers had no knowledge of the missing articles.

The young suspects have been charged and will be brought to court.

FARM NEWS Halton Prominent in Dairy Herd Statistics

J. A. F. During the past year 70 of Halton's dairy farmers have been taking part in the Dairy Herd Improvement Association. This program which combines production per cow, along with cost of production records, is helping dairy production in the county. By using the production figures per county, and comparing the cost of production with the county and provincial averages, dairymen using this program are meeting the cost price squeeze.

Halton county has three associations. F. W. Chisholm is supervisor for the Halton East Association, George W. McCormack is supervisor for the Halton West association and Howard King is supervisor for the Halton Centre association. The project is sponsored by the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture as a service toward efficient dairy production. Each month milk yields and butterfat tests are compiled and records kept on production costs. At the end of the lactation, records are computed for each cow. The Association year is from May 1st to April 30th.

Farmers interested in this program should contact any of the supervisors, or the extension branch of the Ont. Dept. of Agriculture, Milton.
