McClure New Chairman Chamber of Commerce

Reviewing the year's activities, Mr. Crichton pointed to a lengthy list of Chamber accomplishments which included erection of a new advertising sign at the eastern highway approach to town. The Chamber had issued an other business directory and shoppers' guide, and re-edited its industrial brochure, he said, as well as continuing a Christmas decorating contest for homes and cooperating with the fire department in a safety campaign.

On the front page of the Hamilton Spectator of March 18th, an article by Fred Marshall, reported a handle on liquor control in the Provincial Legislative Committee. The only constructive suggestion to come out of this debate he described as follows:

Quote:

The premier said fewer beer parlors but more licensed restaurants should be considered. He suggested that advertising of liquor and beer be allowed, providing the distillers and brewers paid a dollar into the provincial treasury for every dollar spent on advertising, the money accumulated being used for educating the public on matters relating to alcohol. Unquote.

I suggest this was at least a reasonable and constructive suggestion.

My complaint is that it was not the premier who made this suggestion, it was Mr. Bryden, CCF, Woodbine.
