



McClure New Chairman Chamber of Commerce

Harold McClure was elected president of Georgetown Chamber of Commerce when the annual dinner meeting was held on Wednesday at North Halton Golf & Country Club. He succeeds Jack Crichton, who has served two terms in the office. Alex Blackwell is 1st vice-president; Fred Helton secretary; and Lee King, treasurer. A seven man board of directors was also elected at the meeting, comprising Les Perival, William F. Hunter, Harold Hainstone, Jim Jones, Jim Gardiner, Jack Armstrong and Murray Henley.

Reviewing the year's activities, Mr. Crichton pointed to a lengthy list of Chamber accomplishments which included erection of a new advertising sign at the eastern highway approach to town. Lighting will be added to this in the spring and the old sign will be transferred to a new position at the west town limits.

The Chamber had issued another business directory and shoppers' guide and revised its industrial brochure, he said, as well as continuing a "Choke" may decorating contest for homes and cooperatives with the fire department in a safety campaign.

An industrial exhibit at the time of the opening of Delrex Market Centre was a highlight of the year and had drawn much favourable comment from those attending, he said.

A current project is erection of a directional sign at Hornby, pointing travellers coming off Highway 401 to Georgetown.

The Chamber had asked for a drop letter box on Main Street, but this request had been turned down by postal authorities, he said, as being too close to the post office.

Following the election, Jack Armstrong extended thanks to Mr. Crichton for his excellent direction as chairman for two terms.

"My platform is the industrial development of Georgetown," said Mr. McClure as he took the chair. "A group like the Chamber which is non-political and non-sectarian, should be able to play a major part in making this community a better place in which to live."

Selection of four Chamber representatives on Georgetown Industrial Commission was the last item of business. Harold Hainstone, John R. Harber, and Harold Marshall are Chamber appointees this year, with Mr. McClure also serving in his capacity as Chairman.
