## Lower Auto Insurance Rates

A 10 per cent rate reduction on small and compact cars is being introduced in Ontario this week by State Farm Mutual Automobile Insurance Company.

Eric Beard, local agent for State Farm, also announced a reduction in liability rates for nearly two-thirds of the firm's policy holders in Ontario.

In addition, he said, State Farm's second car discount of 25 percent will apply on top of the compact car reduction, giving extra savings to many families with a small second car.

Mr. Beard said the small car reduction, which applies to comprehensive, collision and liability coverages, requires the generally lower repair costs in connection with these cars.

In order to qualify for the 10 per cent cut, a car must weigh 3,000 lbs. or less, be no taller than 20 inches, and have no more than 130 brake horsepower. Imported cars must cost no more than \$2,500 net, plus price, whichever is higher. All makes must be 1959 model year or newer to be eligible.

Most models of the Rambler, Bantam, Conair, Edson, Valiant, all Volkswagens and Renaults and many other cars qualify for the reduction.

State Farm Mutual is the world's largest auto insurer, with nearly 6,000,000 policies in force in the U.S. and Canada. Mr. Beard's office is at 201 Bloor Street West.

Technicians assemble Trans-Canada Air Lines' highly complex Douglas DC-8 simulator in the company's new training building at Mississauga. The \$1,500,000 machine, built by Link Aviation Company, is capable of doing anything the aircraft can do except leave the ground. It even simulates landing gear movement and the movements of pilots for the 550 miles an hour, 127 passenger DC-8's coming to and leaving the aircraft themselves free for research purposes.

More than 120 miles of wire, some thousand feet of vacuum tube, and hundreds of amplifiers and servos, have all been included in the simulator complex, which has been called the largest electronic computer in the world. TCA pilots began training on the simulator at the end of February.


