A Georgetown ladies' rink skipped by Joan Ruddell captured the annual ladies' invitational bonspiel at the new North Hants curling rink Saturday.

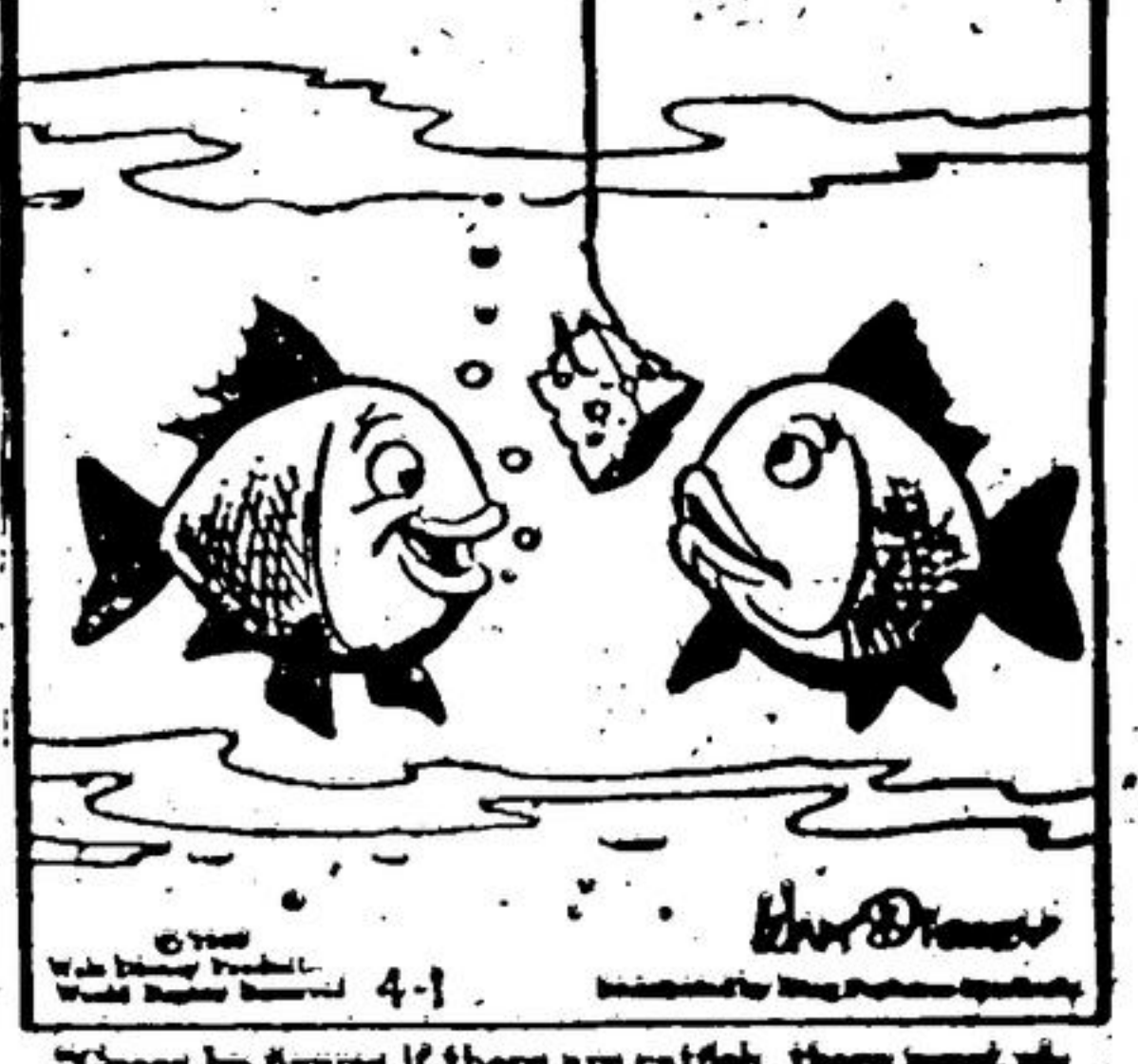
