Raiders Sweep Series Exit Exeter

Georgetown Raiders qualified for the OHA Intermediate 'A' semifinal round here, Friday, by ousting Exeter from the quarter finals in four games of their best of seven series. The final score Friday was Georgetown 8, Exeter 4. The big attendance which left clusters of empty seats in some sections of the rink in the opening game and "grounded" the electricity that usually accompanies play-off hockey, improved only slightly Friday when 600 passed the box office, but the tension was back 100%.

The main reason for the recharged atmosphere was Exeter's unexpected speed and threatening dashes that Raiders found themselves countering with end to end rushes. By the end of the second period the crowd had been whipped to a vocal pitch that approached the toboggan rule severity that made the recent Milton set one of the noisiest in years.

Raiders outscored the Mohawks 10 in the first period but lagged behind Exeter in the middle frame when the Mohawks had the edge in goals, 4 to 3. Blake Inglis took over the reins in the finale and almost singlehandedly liquidated Exeter's chances of prolonging the series by scoring three of the four remaining Raider goals.

There was no scoring in it 9:35 of the first period when Bob Demerse cashed in on a perfect pass from Bud Vasey to put Georgetown into a 1-0 lead. Vasey netted one of his own from Demerse and covered at 4:11 of the second period, but the Mohawks counted a pair of quick ones to make a new game of it. Terry Wade from Ken Doug at 7:21 and Saratar from Doug at 8:09.

Georgetown went ahead on a long shot from outside the blue line by Jerry Inglis, that deflected off a defenceman's glove into an open corner at 10:11. The Mohawks tried at 10:44 but seconds later when Doug Vasey completed a pair

of goals from Jim Russell and Saratar, Wayne Thompson from James Cunningham and Jerry Inglis made it 4-3 at the 12:21 mark but Doug scored on a pass from Leader at 16:30 as the teams finished the period on even terms.

Blake Inglis goals came at 15 seconds, 1:52 and 13:30 on passes from Al White, Jerry Inglis, Doug Richardson and Junior Beaumont and Wayne Thompson tapped in Dave from's rebound at 17:10 to complete the scoring.

Raiders outshot Exeter 10-6 in the first period, 14-13 in the second, and 14-13 in the third for a 42 to 33 total with clubs had five penalties.

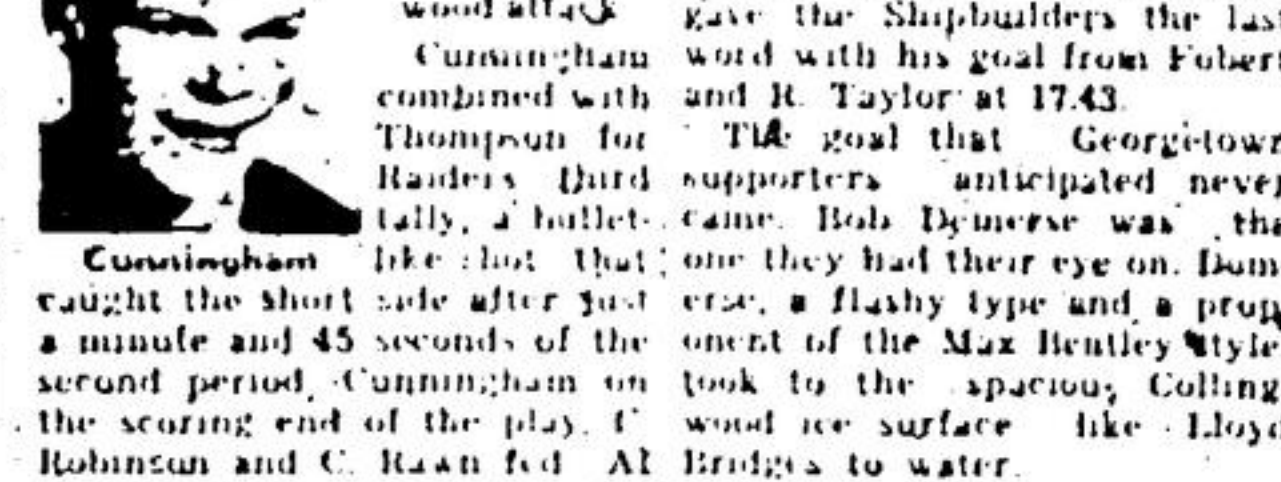
Hay, Mackenzie Rinks Win 'Spiel
