

WHAT COUNCIL DID

**Tax Estimates Not Ready
Mayor, Reeve Argue Point**

"We'll be getting out our tax bills in 1961, if we don't get committee estimates soon," said Reeve Sargent, council's finance chairman, on Monday. "It's quite disturbing to me too," answered Mayor Hyde. "I feel your committee should have more groundwork done," as the two council members exchanged verbal blows at the close of an otherwise quiet night's meeting.

Reeve Sargent said, town auditor Letve had not prepared any estimates on instructions of the mayor, but that no inflicting of this had been given to council.

"Mr. Letve is just completing last year's audit and said he couldn't do any 1960 work until that is finished," said the mayor. "I am sure you should be jogging committees to get their estimates."

The reeve insisted that the auditor could be preparing a rough draft.

"This has been done other years. It is difficult for me to work on anything when my efforts are being undermined," he said.

Mayor Hyde insisted that Mr. Letve could not proceed with any 1960 work until a motion is passed engaging him as auditor.

Reeve Sargent and Cr. Gunn opined that reappointment does not have to be made every year.

"I do," insisted the mayor, "and some councillors have given indications they agree with me."

"Does that mean we haven't got an auditor at present?" asked Deputy Reeve Gray.

"Yes, but he is still working on 1959 work," replied the mayor as the discussion ended.

He lashed out at the Tory machine for their do-little budget in the face of the large scale unemployment, and the growing trade deficit and the financial dependence on the U.S.

Plan First
Subdivision Step**

Amendment of Georgetown's official plan to designate land in the Moore Park subdivision as residential, industrial and commercial from its former agricultural status, was accomplished in a by-law Monday at council meeting. The lengthy changes in town including land at Maple and Guelph from residential to commercial and land on John St. E. from agricultural to residential.

There was divided opinion on another motion which requires that any future agreement governing the subdivision by-law be governed by amendments now being considered by that body.

Cr. Len Cox explained that his committee is considering having subdivisions provide additional services as well as certain changes in industrial assessment requirements, but needs more time for study.

Reeve Sargent and Cr. Kelly and Gunn, who voted against the motion, claimed council should be more specific in such a motion, and that, although in sympathy with the intent, it would be possible for council to indefinitely stall a subdivision.
