Asks Town Council To Reopen Delrex Land Release Negotiations

Industry First Council Replies

Renewing a request for negotiating a land release deal for remaining Delrex residential properties, council on Monday received a letter from the Allen, Hunter, Campbell and Regan law firm which asked that such negotiations reopen within fourteen days.

The letter stated that a story in the March 31st Herald concerning opening of industrial land on the Moore farm had caused conjecture about whether non-discriminatory treatment is absent in the Delrex issue.

The law firm reiterated a request for release of Delrex lands on the same terms as the Lane subdivision. The letter concluded: "Our client has not dealt, and does not now propose to deal, in threats, however, you gentlemen and many Georgetown residents may well have wondered why our client has not long since endeavoured to force the town's hand by court action. Please be assured that the explanation lies not in any doubt as to our client's legal rights, but rather in a genuine belief that a mutually beneficial settlement of issues affecting the town's development is, if at all possible, the preferable way of proceeding."

The mayor said it should also be pointed out that council is considering further amendments to the subdivision by-law. A letter from Moore Park Developments indicating the firm would agree to have a portion of highway frontage decided to the town for a contemplated curve widening, was referred to council's planning committee.

Hope Second Prototype Ready In Few Months

Avian Industries' experimental gyroplane crashed after an unscheduled takeoff at the Waterloo-Wellington Airport, Friday, injuring the pilot, Emil Zuber, of 74 Delrex Blvd.

Waterloo Hospital with a severely fractured left ankle and possible back injuries. His condition was described as 'good.'

The two-seater craft which combines the principals of the helicopter and autogyro was undergoing taxiing tests when it unexpectedly became airborne.

Georgetown In Top 20 In English, Math Tests

Results received recently at the High School from the Department of Education place Georgetown High School in the eighty-sixth percentile in English, and in the seventy-ninth percentile in Mathematics following recently administered SATO tests.

These tests (Scholastic Aptitude Tests - Ontario) have been administered to every Grade Twelve Student in the Province in English and Mathematics. A similar test in Chemistry will be written later in the Term.

A more practical interpretation of these results would read as follows: Georgetown students in English stand in the top 14% of all provincial students. In Mathematics, the Georgetown students rank in the top 21% of the same group.

In local individual standings, Collin Hayward was top boy in English, followed by Carolyn Taylor, Frances Bauer, and Ian Murray; the latter three tied for second place.
