Present Safety Awards To Brewery Drivers

Brewers' Warehousing Co. held their annual Safe Drivers Award banquet at Rosslyn Grove on Wednesday, April 6. Of the total of 24 drivers, 23 received Ontario Safety League Awards emblematic of 12 accident free months of driving. In attendance were drivers and staffs from Kitchener, Guelph, Galt, Stratford, Hanover and the Company's Equipment Service Division. The 23 drivers represented 96 per cent of eligible drivers and have averaged a total of 139 years of accident-free driving. The top award winner was Mr. M. McCauley of Stratford who received his 12 year award, representing 12 years of accident free driving. **Brewers' Warehousing Co.
