### Present Safety Awards To Brewery Drivers

Brewers' Warehousing Co. held their annual Safe Drivers' Award banquet at Rosslyn Grove on Wednesday, April 6. Of the total of 24 drivers, 23 received Ontario Safety League Awards emblematic of 12 accident-free months of driving. In attendance were drivers and staffs from Kitchener, Guelph, Galt, Stratford, Hanover and the Company's Equipment Service Division. The 23 drivers represented 96 per cent of eligible drivers and have amassed a total of 139 years of accident-free driving. The top award winner was Mr. M. McCauley of Stratford who received his 12 year award, representing 12 years of accident-free driving.

Brewers' Warehousing Co. Ltd. is a cooperative distributing enterprise, wholly owned by the breweries whose products are sold and distributed thru its stores and warehouses. Its operations include 209 retail stores and 70 distributing depots in the Province of Ontario.

The gathering was advised that in the entire Kitchener District of 36 regular drivers, 35 will receive Safety Awards for 1959. This places 97 per cent of the drivers among the award winners. The company is particularly proud of this record when it is realized this covers over 350,000 miles of driving on all types of roads under all weather conditions, and with all types of traffic conditions from rural, to congested city driving.
