COLIN HAYWARD GETS OTTAWA ROTARY TRIP

GIS student Colin Hayward, 33 Henry St. will soon be starting on "Adventure in Citizenship" which will feature four concentrated days in Canada's capital May 9-12 learning how the nation is governed.

186 selected students from throughout the country will participate in the project which is sponsored by the Rotary Club of Ottawa. The local Rotary club has looked after transportation and registration expenses. About two thirds of the Canadian Rotary Clubs responded to the invitation to send a leading "all round" student for the Adventure.

Once in Ottawa the boys and girls will see the procession for the Opening of Parliament on May 10th and later tour the Parliament Buildings where they will receive Canadian Citizenship Certificates from Hon. Ellen Fairclough, Minister of Citizenship and Immigration. Other visits will include Government House (Governor General Vanier's residence), the National Gallery and a detailed tour of the RCMP barracks and crime laboratories. Students will attend a series of lectures on government and political science at Carleton University and be shown both the present and future National Capital by the National Capital Commission.

Students were selected on the basis of scholastic standing, participation in school activities, and ability in public speaking. After their Adventure in Citizenship in Ottawa is over they are scheduled to describe their experiences and impressions to home-town audiences.

Will Assist Bolton in Ambulance Service

Georgetown's Volunteer Ambulance Service is assisting in the inauguration of a similar ambulance brigade at Bolton.

Local ambulance officials met with a delegation from Bolton last Thursday at Howard Wrigglesworth Public School to enlighten them on the steps in organization.

Ambulance brigade chief, Ed Hall, outlined the various points in favour of such a system, and an inspection was made of both Georgetown ambulances.

Among the visitors were Mrs. M. King, president of the Bolton Association, D. Wallis, secretary, W. E. Downey, reeve of Bolton, P. McCool, councillor for Toronto, etc.

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Ratepayers Demand Delrex East Roads Be Fixed Immediately

With roads a main item on the business agenda, members of Delrex Ratepayers Association attended a meeting in Wrigglesworth School auditorium on Wednesday.

The meeting heard a report by William Carr, association president, on four questions submitted by the executive to town council for answer. Mr. Carr explained that ratepayers are caught in the middle of a difference of opinion between council and Delrex Development over specifications for "graded and gravelled roads" as contained in a 1954 agreement when the Delrex area was zoned for the town.

In 1957, he explained, the Dept. of Highways had introduced specifications which must be met before a 50% government subsidy would be paid on town road maintenance. Council insists that these specifications be met before roads in the subdivision will be assumed as a town responsibility.

JUNIOR RED CROSS AIDS CHILD REFUGEES

A total of \$2,185.08 has been contributed for Junior Red Cross work by public school pupils in Halton Inspectorate No. 1. The area comprises Georgetown, Acton, Milton, Oakville, Esquimaux and Nassawega.

A campaign was conducted in the schools during the months of February and March, and locally, many novel ways were used to raise money including class auction sales and penny sales.

Main 1959 project of the Junior Red Cross is its support of World Refugee Year and its funds have been allocated to assist refugee children in Canada an objective of \$150,000 has been set, and the Ontario group hopes to raise \$100,000 of this. It will be used for food for Algerian children in Tunisia and Morocco, medical care for child refugees in Hong Kong, and self help projects for boys and girls in camps in Syria, Jordan, Lebanon and Gaza.

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"Unfortunately, anything we do voluntarily is interpreted by council as our responsibility," he said. "The present council wants to live strictly by the agreement and it is only fair that our company does the same."

He said that Mr. Heslop would be pleased to meet with any committee of ratepayers to discuss roads. Generally speaking, he continued, the agreement does not call for any maintenance of roads. Eight inches of coarse stone have been placed on subdivision roads, he said, and pointed out that the Dept. of Highways had made its specifications three years after the agreement was made.

A motion asking council to put East Delrex roads in DHO specifications immediately was passed by the meeting after much discussion from the floor.

Some ratepayers wanted to add a clause that the work be paid for by Delrex Development, but a majority considered that this was a matter which council must settle.

"I feel it's up to council to put the roads in order and fight it out with the developer

afterwards" said Robert McNeilly, who with W. W. Richmond moved the motion.

Martin Horan pointed out that taxes will be increased if no money comes from the company for road improvements.

John Healey said roads in the subdivision are atrocious and that the town council has said it intends to do all in its power to give good roads. He said that association pressure should be brought on the company.

Pearce Porter said his part of the subdivision had been through the road problem a few years ago and that any new area has to live through a few tough periods.

Complaint by a ratepayer of a ditch behind Baylawn Crescent being dangerous for children will be investigated by the executive.

A suggestion of also being considered to request use of part of the shopping plaza area for a playground for area children.

Stephen Jones, industrial commissioner and manager of Kitchener Chamber of Commerce, was a guest at the

meeting and showed a film produced in the States which depicted things necessary for a town to encourage industrial development.

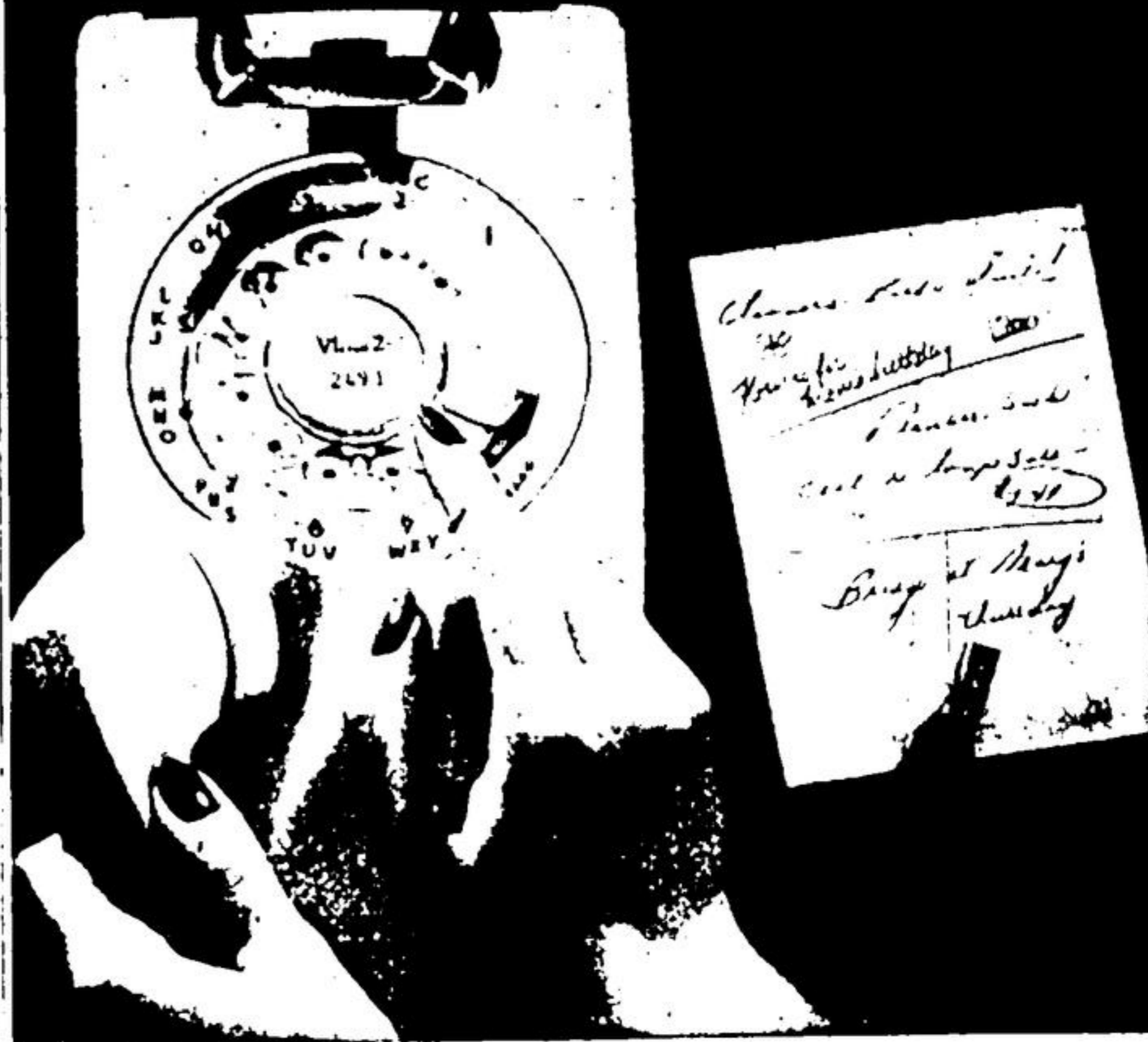
Getting new industry is a tough job, he said, and an important point is that residents be enthusiastic about their community and boost it constantly. The man in the street can often give industrial leads, he said, simply by passing on casual information he hears. If a town wants a paid industrial promoter, it must budget at least \$50,000 over a 3-year period be pointed out.

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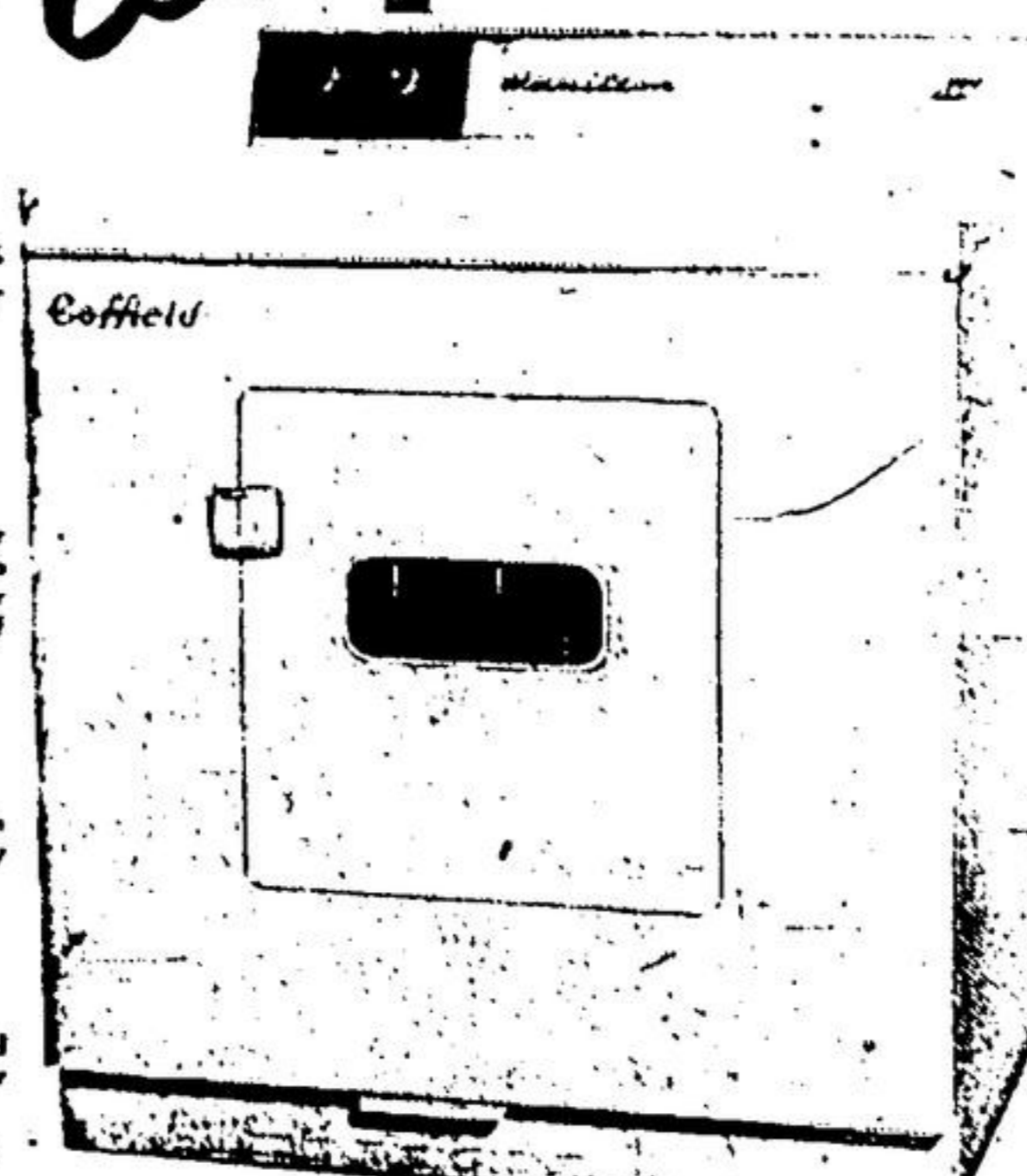
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
