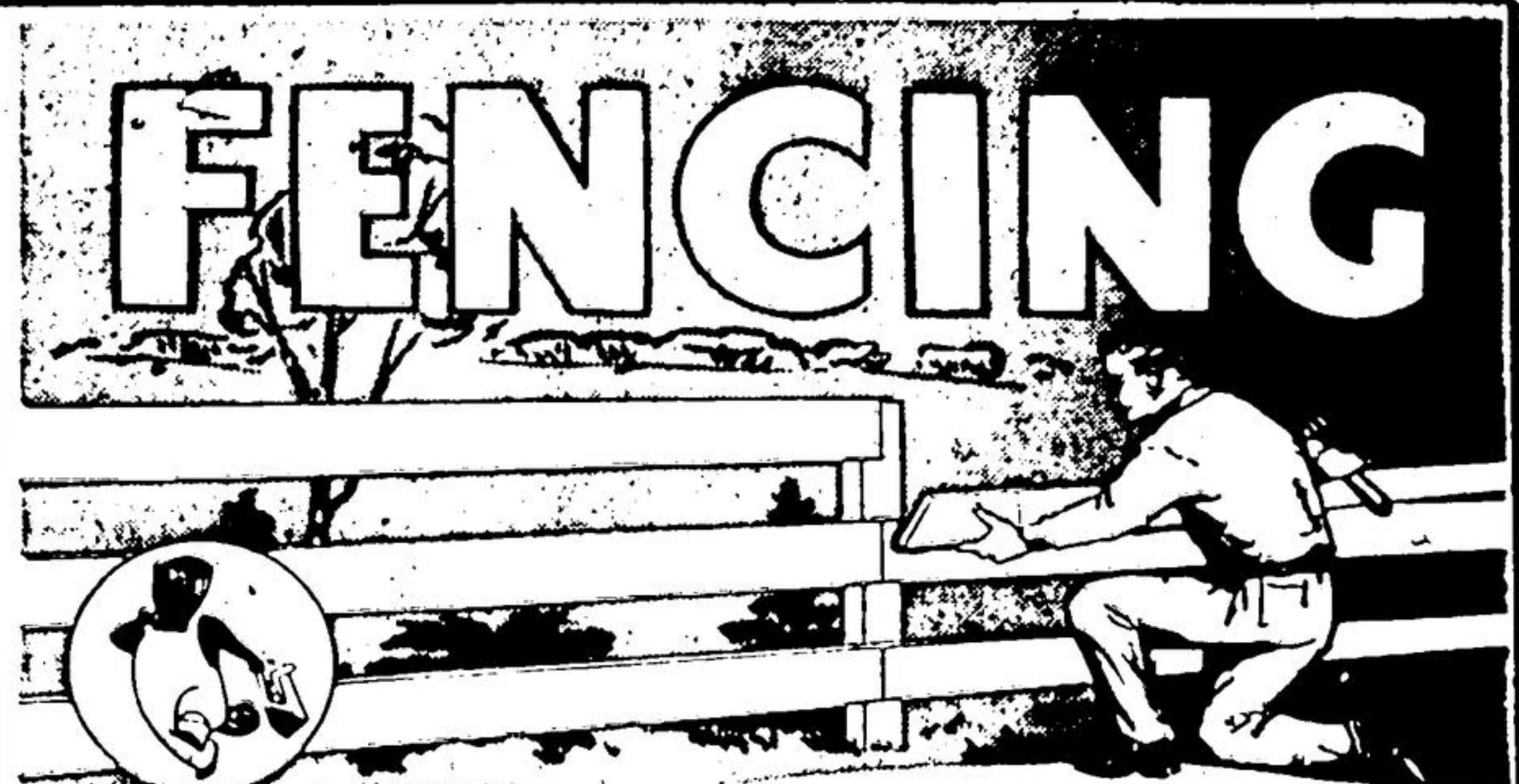
A quarter page ad in the financial year book will be part of the commission's future program to advertise Georgetown's industrial advantages. New brochures will also be prepared.

Chief Roy Haley said the boy got the matches from the pulpit in the room during the service. According to police the boy should have been sitting in the choir at the time. The blaze was apparently accidental.

The fire was put out by church towards who noticed the smoke. Chief Haley said though the cause of the investigation his department had become particularly annoyed with gossips who spread wild rumors and made up their own accounts of the incident based on half truths and innuendo.
