

Book Circulation Was Over 4,000 In March

March, 1960, proved to be one of the busiest months at the Georgetown Public Library, according to statistics.

Total book circulation for the month was 4,048. The daily record was March 19th when 485 books were checked out. There were 81 new members during the month bringing the total membership to 2400.

Among the new books at the library this month are the late Nevil Shute's "Trustees from the Roof Room," "What is the Star?" by Arthur Rook, "The Strange One," Fred Bodsworth, "Ourselves to Know," John O'Hara and "Mrs. Aris Goes to New York" by Paul Gallico.

troversional "Oedipus and Akhnaton" and the Popellennessy biography of Queen Mary, "Good Housekeeping's Complete Book of Needlecraft, Close-Up on Writing for Television, The Mentally Retarded Child."
