

Napanee Title Holders for Third Successive Year

Raiders Get Shut-out Lose Saturday Game

The John Ross Robertson trophy and accompanying honours will rest in Napanee for another twelve months.

Napanee's Intermediate "A" Comets captured the provincial title for the third consecutive year Saturday night in their home ice, where they rolled to a 3 to 2 win over Georgetown Raiders and clinched the best of seven series, four games to two.

Raiders blanked the Comets 5 to 0 in the 5th game here Friday night and looked capable of overtopping the two game huge. But the charms wore off somewhere between John St. West and the Napanee arena.

It was the second time in three years that the Raiders have had to settle for being the second best Intermediate "A" team in the OHA fold. They capped the "B" title last year.

Napanee operated at full throttle before their home fans and deserved the win territorially. They notched the only goal in the first period and did all the scoring in the second, which ended 3 to 0.

A quick outburst early in the third period left Raiders with six goals to make up. They reclaimed a pair before the half way mark in the period but the attack lost its effectiveness when Dave Joyce drew a penalty. The Comets pounced on the pause in the Raider drive to net a pair of their own, and the rest was up to the Sportmen. Raiders had the last word, but it was little consolation.

Raiders' first line was crippled for a big part of the first period when Doug Richardson objected too vigorously to a tripping call and picked up a ten minute misconduct penalty. Napanee went on a shoot-

Napanee Comets worked Raiders into an almost inescapable corner with their third successive win Wednesday night in Napanee to take a 3 to 1 lead in the OHA Intermediate "A" final series.

Raiders won the first game 6 to 2 before hitting the skids. The damaging blows that put them in their precarious position came on scores of 9-1, 7-3, and 4-2.

Raiders appeared destined to tie the series Wednesday particularly after taking a hasty 4 goal lead after just 44 seconds had gone by in the first period. But the wily blue shirted Napanees and the ever-presently lucky had other ideas.

Blake Inglis was fet by Junior Beaumont on the tally which stood up for approximately four minutes before Napanee capitalized on a miscue. A slap shot by Wally Magdy that hit a leg and rebounded into the centre ice area sent Jack McKeown away on a three man break with Brady and Johnny Green that resulted in the first Napanee counter.

The second one was a clean cut pattern play that Griffen picked behind Smith after taking a pass from George Jacklin at 5:22.

Raiders pulled even again at 17:00 when Bob Demersie tried a pass from Bud Varry. It was another Raider blunder that put the Comets ahead to stay.

Jack White was the last Napanee tuler to touch the puck before it eluded Barry Smith at the 2 minute and 30 second mark of the third period and got credit for the winner which was actually knocked behind a surprised Smith by Bob Demersie.

With time running out Raiders threw six attackers at the home club in a final desperate bid to erase the costly accident, but the move fizzled as Napanee took advantage of the empty net to clinch the win.

Les Douglas was the marksman on the final tally with help from Gilmour.

Probably Georgetown's best chance to change places in their favour came in the third period when Doug Richardson pulled Napanee goalie Norm Parsh out on his face and then hit a post with his shot.

The statistics tell an amazing story that unfortunately for Raiders doesn't count on the score sheet. Despite taking six penalties to Napanee's 1, Raiders outshot their opposition 34 to 22.

This will be the second consecutive year for the livestock programme. From last year's experience it is expected that the week will be one of interesting and informative discussions on the problems of the livestock industry.
