TOWNSHIP OF EQUEQUING

NOTICE of stopping up certain portions of the original allowance for road being part of Chelton Street and Alexander Street on Registered Plan Number 10 registered in the Registry Office of the County of Halton and authorizing the conveyance of the portions so stopped up to the adjoining owners.

TAKE NOTICE that the Municipal Council of the Township of Equequing proposes to pass a By-law to close and stop up certain portions of the original allowance for road being part of the East half of Lot 20, Concession 9 in the Township of Equequing in the County of Halton more particularly as defined as follows, that is to say:

THAT ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Township of Equequing in the County of Halton and Province of Ontario and being composed of part of the East half of Lot 20 in Concession 9 in the said Township of Equequing as shown on filed Registered Plan Number 10 on file in the Registry Office for the said County of Halton and known as Heron's Plan of the Village of Glen Williams in the said Township containing an area of approximately 450 acres be the same more or less and which said parcel of land is more particularly described as follows:

PREMISING that the South westerly limit of Chelton Street shown on said Registered Plan Number 10 has a bearing of North 46 deg 22' 00" West and relating all bearings herein thereto.

COMMENCING at the point of intersection of the South westerly limit of Chelton Street with the Southeasterly limit of Alexander Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10.

THENCE North 36 deg 04' 00" East along the said Southeasterly limit of Alexander Street 123.64 feet more or less to the point of intersection of the said Southeasterly limit of Alexander Street with the Southerly limit of the lands of The Canadian National Railways as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10.

THENCE Westerly along the said Southerly limit of the lands of the Canadian National Railways along a course to the left having a radius of 2704.00 feet a chord distance of 68.09 feet to a point bearing of North 86 deg 11' 20" West to the point of intersection of the said Southerly limit of the lands of the Canadian National Railways with the Northwesterly limit of Alexander Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10.

THENCE South 36 deg 04' 00" West along the said Northwesterly limit of Alexander Street 25.53 feet more or less to the point of intersection of the said Northwesterly limit of Alexander Street with the Northerly limit of Chelton Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10.

THENCE North 46 deg 22' 00" West along the said Northerly limit of Chelton Street 123.64 feet more or less to the point of intersection of the said Northerly limit of Chelton Street with the Northerly limit of Alexander Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10.

THENCE Westerly along the said Northerly limit of Alexander Street 123.64 feet more or less to the point of intersection of the said Northerly limit of Alexander Street with the Northerly limit of Chelton Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10.

THENCE South 46 deg 22' 00" East along the said Northerly limit of Chelton Street 25.53 feet more or less to the point of intersection of the said Northerly limit of Chelton Street with the Northerly limit of Alexander Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10.

AND to authorize the conveyance of the portions so stopped up to the adjoining owners.

The said By-law will be dealt with at a meeting of the Council to be held for the purpose of considering the said By-law on Monday, the 8th day of June, 1960, at the hour of 8 o'clock in the evening at the Municipal Office, Stewarttown, Ont.
