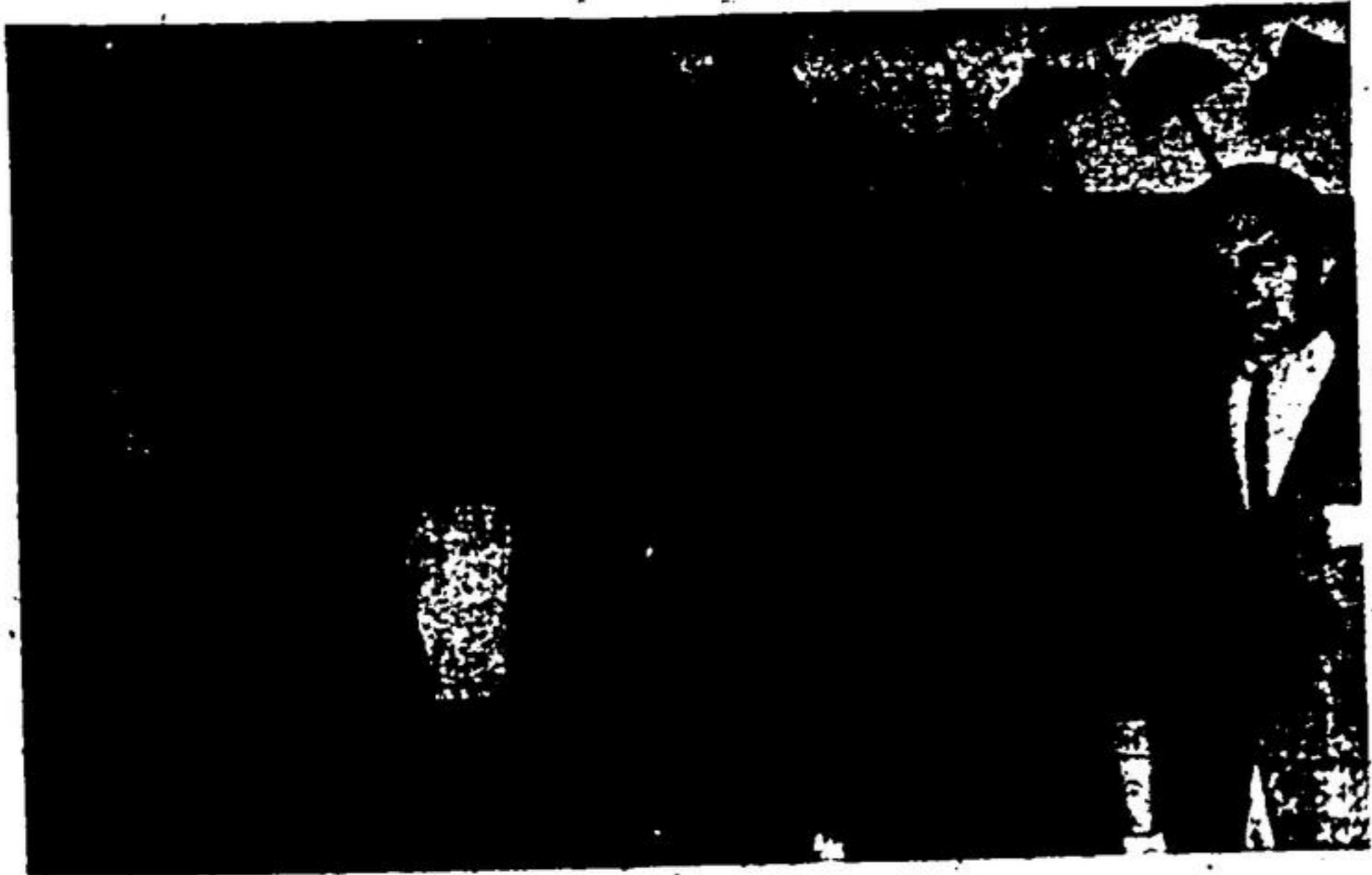

Towns Would Combine For Industrial Promotion

Common problems brought about inception of the North Halton Urban Board, consisting of Georgetown, Acton and Milton. That the problems are still common was illustrated again at last week's meeting.

Both Acton and Georgetown have engaged Cecil Robertson of Glen Williams as their dog control officer, at the same per capita rate. Acton received a copy of Georgetown's agreement, and they will draw up a similar one.

Industrial promotion on a tri-town basis, which evoked a lengthy discussion at the last meeting, was again briefly discussed. It was felt the three industrial committee chairmen of the towns should meet separately.

Mayor Sid Childs of Milton reported the Trade and Indus-

tries Branch of the Dept. of Planning and Development, will not grant dollar for dollar to a three town group for industrial promotion. They will only grant on a regional basis, which in North Halton's case is Region 9, which includes Metro Toronto.

Chairman John Elliott suggested the three towns have a joint meeting with the Trade and Industry Branch, who will send out experts to discuss industrial promotion.

Milton won't oppose the curtailment of the Barrie Hamilton passenger service. They reached this conclusion when an advertisement advising the public to register their objections, if any, drew only one response.

On being questioned about the functioning of the Milton Recreation Commission, Mr. Childs told the members it had not worked out as well as had been hoped. He said that in order to be successful there had to be 100% support behind it. Georgetown is considering forming such a commission.

Both Milton and Georgetown are trying to deal the parking problem by merchant subsidized parking lots. However, Georgetown is running into more problems than Milton in acquiring the necessary land. According to Mayor E. Hyde expropriation may be the last resort.

A Parking Authority formed by Milton, will be closely watched by the other two towns.

If nursery lovers complain Georgetown taxpayers should be happy to know that the Milton mill rate is 65.5 residential and 70 industrial and commercial, while Acton's mill rate is 74 mills residential, and 78 industrial and commercial.

WHAT COUNCIL DID
Robertson Takes Over Dog Controller Duties

Final arrangements for dog control in town were made by council on May 2nd.

An agreement is being signed with Cecil Robertson, Glen Williams, who commenced duties on May 1st. The town did not renew an arrangement with Oakville Humane Society this year, declining to pay an increased fee required by that organization.

Mr. Robertson is to receive 20¢ per capita, which will be revised annually on the town assessor's figures. He will supply a vehicle and quarters for dogs picked up, and will be subject to Humane Society regulations. Payment will be made semi-annually in advance.

Mr. Robertson will also receive a fee not to exceed \$5. for dogs claimed by owners, who must also pay him a \$1. per day boarding charge.

He will maintain a regular patrol in town and will notify owners of tagged dogs as soon as possible after they are picked up. A \$2,000 performance bond is required from him by council.

Bevve Sargent, Deputy Reeve Gray and Cr. Harrison did not support council's motion.

Council will also decline to pay a \$100 account recently submitted by Oakville Humane Society for services to date this year. Council claims their contract ran from April to April and that no money is owing.

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Dr. Charles Best in Research Brain Work

Three research projects have been undertaken by doctors of the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto for the scientific study of mental retardation. H. E. Foster, honorary president of the Ontario Association for Retarded Children, told the conference at Hamilton Friday.

Dr. Charles Best, at the Hanting Institute, is directing a study to determine certain basic biochemistry of the normal brain so that doctors will have some yardstick in measuring brain chemical deviations, he said.

A second project at the Ontario Hospital, under the direction of Dr. A. I. Chute is a surgical analysis aimed at learning more about amino acids and how they are related to mental retardation.

The third study is being undertaken at Toronto Psychiatric Hospital by Dr. A. B. Stokes, Dr. J. S. Lovell-Doust, and E. Cassell. This one is a probe of the psychological and physical conditions affecting the forming of a child in the womb. An expectant mother is being observed under close clinical screening during her entire period of confinement.



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
