

DAMAGE IN SUNDAY MISHAP

Damage was estimated at \$400 when a 1949 Plymouth driven by August Speich of 12 Academy Road collided with a parked car in front of Smith and Glenn Sunday.

Speich was driving north on Victoria and making a right turn onto Glen Road when the accident occurred. The other car, a 1958 Plymouth owned by Clarence King of 29 Byron St. was parked opposite the guard's office.

THAT ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Township of Esquening in the County of Ontario and being composed of part of the East half of Lot 20 in Concession 9 in the said Township of Esquening as shown on Registered Plan Number 10 on file in the Registry Office for the said County of Halton and known as Resor's Plan of the Village of Glen Williams in the said Township, containing an area of approximately 4.04 acres by or more or less and which said parcel of land is more particularly described as follows:

PREMISING that the South westerly limit of Chelton Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10 has a bearing of North 46 deg 22'00" West and relating all bearings herein thereto;

COMMENCING at the point of intersection of the South westerly limit of Chelton Street with the Southeastern limit of Alexander Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10;

THENCE North 36 deg 08'00" East, along the said Southeastern limit of Alexander Street, 121.64 feet more or less to the point of intersection of the said Southeastern limit of Alexander Street with the Southern limit of the lands of the Canadian National Railways crossing part of the said Registered Plan Number 10;

THENCE West, along the said Southern limit of the lands of the Canadian National Railways along a curve to the left having a radius of 274.93 feet on a chord distance of 160.89 feet on a chord bearing of North 65 deg 11'20" West to the point of intersection of the said Southern limit of the lands of the Canadian National Railways with the Northwesterly limit of Alexander Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10;

THENCE South 26 deg 08'00" West, along a said Northwesterly limit of Alexander Street, 35.55 feet more or less to the point of intersection of the said Northwesterly limit of Alexander Street with the Northeastern limit of Chelton Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10;

THENCE North 46 deg 22'00" West, along the said Northwesterly limit of Chelton Street 100.14 feet more or less to the point of intersection of the said Northwesterly limit of Chelton Street with the Southeastern limit of Alexander Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10;

THENCE South 46 deg 22'00" East, along the said Southeastern limit of Alexander Street 340.06 feet more or less to the point of commencement.

AND the Council of the Township of Esquening authorizes the conveyance of the portion so stopped up to the adjoining owners.

Dry Cleaning System: Here Betters Britain

Harry Fotheringham of Fotheringham Cleaners in Hamilton was the guest speaker at a meeting of the Halton and Peel Dry Cleaners Institute in the Queen's Hotel, Brampton, last Tuesday night. The chairman, Don Barrager of Barrager's Cleaners introduced Mr. Fotheringham who told the members of the need for package type dry cleaning plants in England where in some cases there are communities of 35,000 or more with inadequate drycleaning facilities.

He said the cleaning itself is done at large plants in the greater populated areas and the best service time is six days. He said a number of local drycleaners have undertaken a program there in the first effort to overcome the need and the first package type plant will be in operation in possibly two months.

Mr. Fotheringham who has done extensive travelling in Great Britain was instrumental in breaking the group into the new field.
