Plan Provincial Police Headquarters, Burlington

Public Works Minister Ray Connell today called tenders on a Headquarters, Garage, and Cell Block for the Ontario Provincial Police in Burlington. The \$300,000 structure to be built on a site south of the Brant Memorial Hospital off No. 2 Highway, north of the Burlington Skyway, will serve Wentworth, Halton, Norfolk and Brant Counties. The administration section will be two-stories with full basement. Walls will be brick with concrete slab floor and roof. Behind will be the garage building with space for 14 cars, four repair stalls, wash rack and storage facilities. The Provincial Police are now operating from the Dundas town offices in cramped quarters for the services needed for the rapidly growing area of the greatest town in Canada. O.P.P. Commissioner W. H. Clark said Inspector J. R. Huber will be in charge of the new Burlington headquarters with a staff of 45 officers.

Highway 401 To Galt Probably By December

Two new sections of No. 401 Highway will be opened this year to bring to completion more than 300 miles of the super-highway designed to span the province from Windsor to the Quebec border. Department of Highway officials hope to open an 18-mile section from Newcastle to Port Hope late in June. If wet weather continues, it could delay the opening until July, they said. To the west, officials expect another 25 miles will be opened from just north of Milton to No. 24 Highway at Galt and Hespeler by December. There are 273 miles of the proposed 508-mile highway completed. The highway is expected to be finished by 1963. Plans for next year call for the closing of the gap between Napanee and Prescott. Grading and other preliminary work was reported in progress on this stretch.
