### WHAT COUNCIL DID

**"Wording Is Misleading" Says Council, Orders Sign Removed**

A new sign erected by Delirex Development Co. on the highway off-ramp was ordered removed after a council debate Monday.

A Hunter-Kelly sign was found to be misleading, four council members felt that council action was too arbitrary and that objections should first be received with the sign.

Revenue Sargent asked that a record of sign removals be kept. Deputy Revenue Sargent, C. S. Casper, and Gunn opposed the sign removal while the other two council members voted in favor.

The matter is referred to council attention at a later date when a letter from the Delirex firm mentioned that they had agreed to erect a sign without first asking council permission, as required by the zoning by-law. The by-law also requires a sign to be built on a lot and not on the highway.

At that time, C. H. Hunter-Kelly, Delirex Development Co., said the wording of the sign, which includes the phrase "Member of Georgetown Chamber of Commerce and Georgetown Industrial Commission."

This could indicate that the offices of these groups are located in the building, he said.

**Opposes Specialist Aid Board Secretary Resigns**

At Col. Gordon Brown has resigned as secretary of the Georgetown High School District Board.

Col. Brown, who threatened to resign if the board favored assisting financially teachers taking specialist courses, at a previous meeting made the resignation official Tuesday night.

Mr. Brown's resignation was based on an incident which occurred at a meeting of the board on May 24th when he announced that he would resign if the board decided to assist financially teachers taking specialist courses.

The decision came out of a heated debate at the April meeting which ended when Col. Brown resigned. He was named chairman of the board by the board members.

The board is experiencing a shortage of specialist teachers and has had little response to the board's request for more specialist teachers.

"I've always tried to be fair in my opinion," he said, "but I cannot change my policy now." He stated the secretary before confronting the chairman with his resignation. His resignation found support from board members for Esquimaux Terrace.

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## Investigate Possibility of Renting Town Vehicles

A suggestion of Mayor Hyde of getting tax concessions, and his opinion that a rental system would be more expensive, as the owner of vehicles must make his profit, was shared by the council Tuesday night.

Property chairman Wm. F. Hunter was asked to secure rental figures for the next meeting.

Council reviewed a budget comparison as of the end of April. Most departments are following their budget quite well, according to Finance Chairman Sargent, and there was general agreement that rent financing is following a sensible pattern.

Pointing out that twice a week garbage collection should start on June 1st, Revenue Sargent said an advertisement indicating this should be in the newspaper this week.

Work on Delirex East roads has been delayed by wet weather, engineer J. H. High reported, but he has assurance that work will progress as weather permits.
