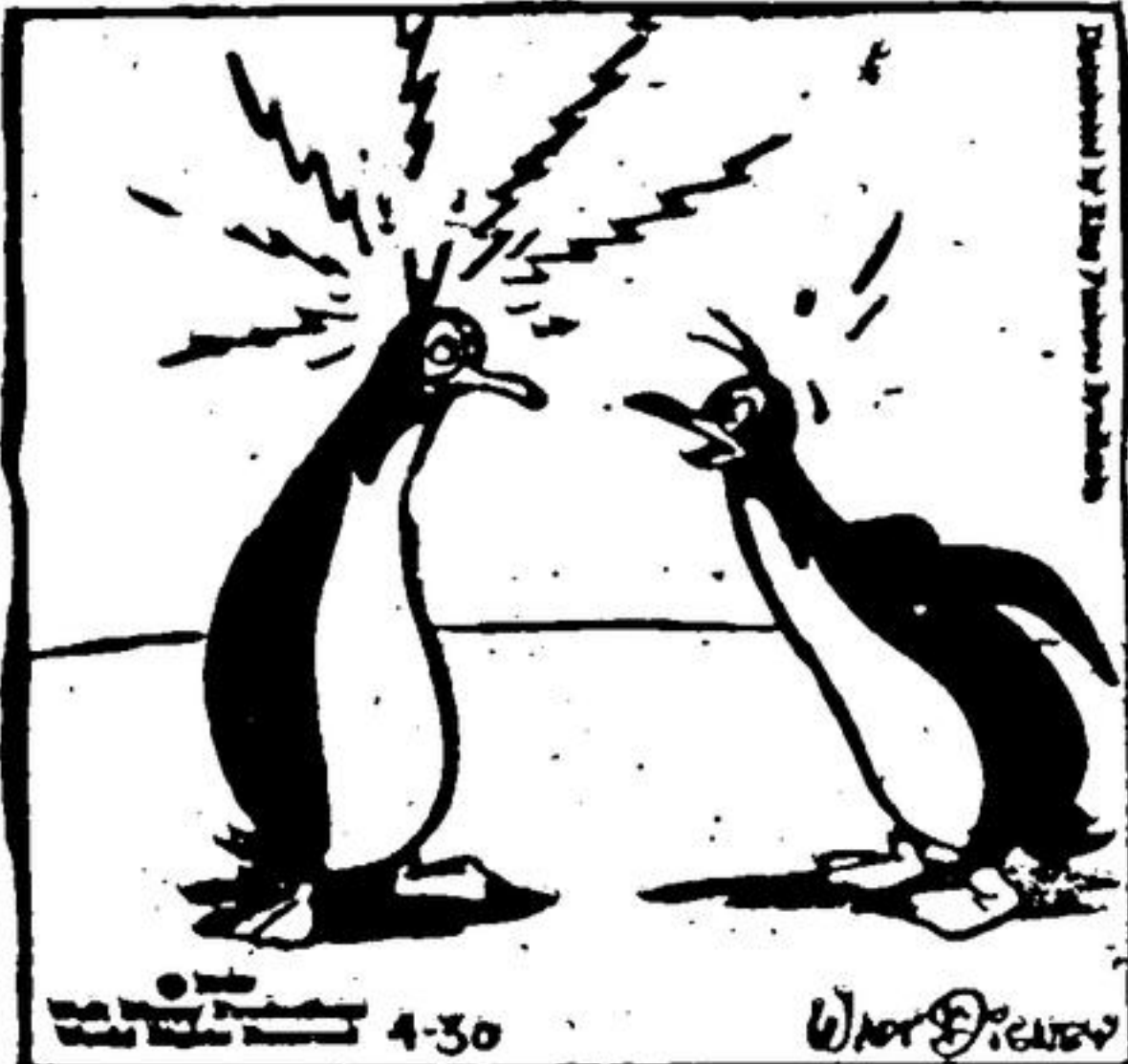

Georgetown Man Appointed County Conservation Board

Georgetown's representative on the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, Alex McLaren has been named as the authority representative on the Halton County Conservation Committee. The appointment was made at the May meeting of the CVCA following a request from the Halton group for a representative.

The parks and recreation board have recommended that tenders be called immediately on receipt of departmental approval for work on the big pond and supply pond at the Terra Cotta Conservation Area. The large pond is presently being cleared of stumps.

The field officer has reported that the Canadian National Institute for the Blind will be operating the refreshment concession at the Terra Cotta Conservation Area for the 1960 season.

The advisory board have also recommended to the Authority that work on the swing

bridge at Belfountain Park be proceeded with immediately on receipt of departmental approval.

The matter of the poor condition of the access road to the Terra Cotta Conservation Area should be taken up at the next Authority meeting. It was suggested by the advisory board. The board also proposed that an application be made to the Parks Integration Board of Ontario.

The Authority chairman Mr. A. M. Greenaway informed the members that Field Officer Ted Suttler will be terminating his service with the department to accept a position with the Toronto and Regional Conservation Authority.

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority may establish an area park at the Forks of the Credit, if public opinion is favorable. A letter from the Mississauga Sportsmen's Organization requested the member for Peel to press for establishment of a park there.

Farm and Home Week Will Draw Visitors to OAC

More than half a century ago your grandfather on the farm packed up the family and took the annual excursion by train to the "Model Farm" at Guelph. It was an event anticipated for months, and besides teaching the family a good deal about farming, it provided an outing that was the subject of conversation for long afterwards.

With the coming of modern methods of transportation, and the progress that the years have brought, the nature of "Farm and Home Week" at the Ontario Agricultural College has changed somewhat, but farmers and their families still visit their College each year. Last year the College was "at home" to more than 12,000 people. This year "Farm and Home Week" is to be held at the College from June 7-10, and will provide an opportunity for farmers and their families to see the latest developments in modern agriculture, and get acquainted with the men at the College who are helping them to solve the prob-

lems of the complicated and difficult business of farming.

If your grandfather were to visit the O.A.C. this June, he would see some remarkable changes. He would see the new Soils building, the new Biology building and the new Physical Education building. He would be amazed at the great part that science and research play in modern agriculture. He would be driven around the thousand acre campus in modern busses. He would be mystified by talk about herbicides, insecticides, and vitamins and hormones, and he would be fascinated by the modern machinery that makes it possible for one man to produce as much as five men did in his day.

The staff at Macdonald Institute has prepared an interesting program of tours and demonstrations for the ladies.

The welcome mat will be out at the O.A.C. from June 7-10, and the College officials hope that farmers and their families from all over the province will plan to attend this annual event.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Add Another Vehicle To Works Department

Addition of a new vehicle to the town works department, under discussion for some time, was made by council May 24, but only after another lengthy discussion.

A motion to purchase a 1/2-ton Ford from Masval Motors, formerly owned by Thompson Hardware, for \$275, found majority approval. Reeve Sargent and Cr. Harrison voted against the motion on a recorded vote.

Cr. Harrison said he would not support the motion unless

it specified what the truck would be used for. A second hand truck should not be used for heavy work, he said, and although the idea is to have it used as a vehicle for the town foreman, he claimed the motion should say so. He also criticized a recommendation from the property and roads chairman, saying the question should first have been discussed by the property committee. Road Chairman Walter Gray said the town is paying a lot

of money in truck rental at present and that he thinks it is a good buy. Property chairman Hunter said he had tried to call a committee meeting, but couldn't arrange it, and that there was no intention of bypassing a committee.

With Reeve Sargent opposed as he does not favour selling the property, council approved engaging W. H. Carr to survey a property on James St. prior to offering it for sale.

Informed that Dahl Construction Co. is interested in having sewer and water services extended into the Walter Hyde property on Ontario St., council will arrange a committee of the whole meeting

with the company on Thursday evening.

Approval was given to spending \$486 to increase a planned 15" storm sewer in the Lane subdivision to 24" and \$825 for an extra 130 ft. of sewer to connect with Shelley St. along Keats Ave.

Deputy Reeve Gray explained that storm sewer is necessary in that area and it is a better deal for the town to hook in now than to do the job later.

Invitation bids are being asked for prime, seal and chip work on a number of town streets, including the Sunbeam area, Arletta St. and Swanek subdivision, Maple Ave. W and the Charles St. extension.

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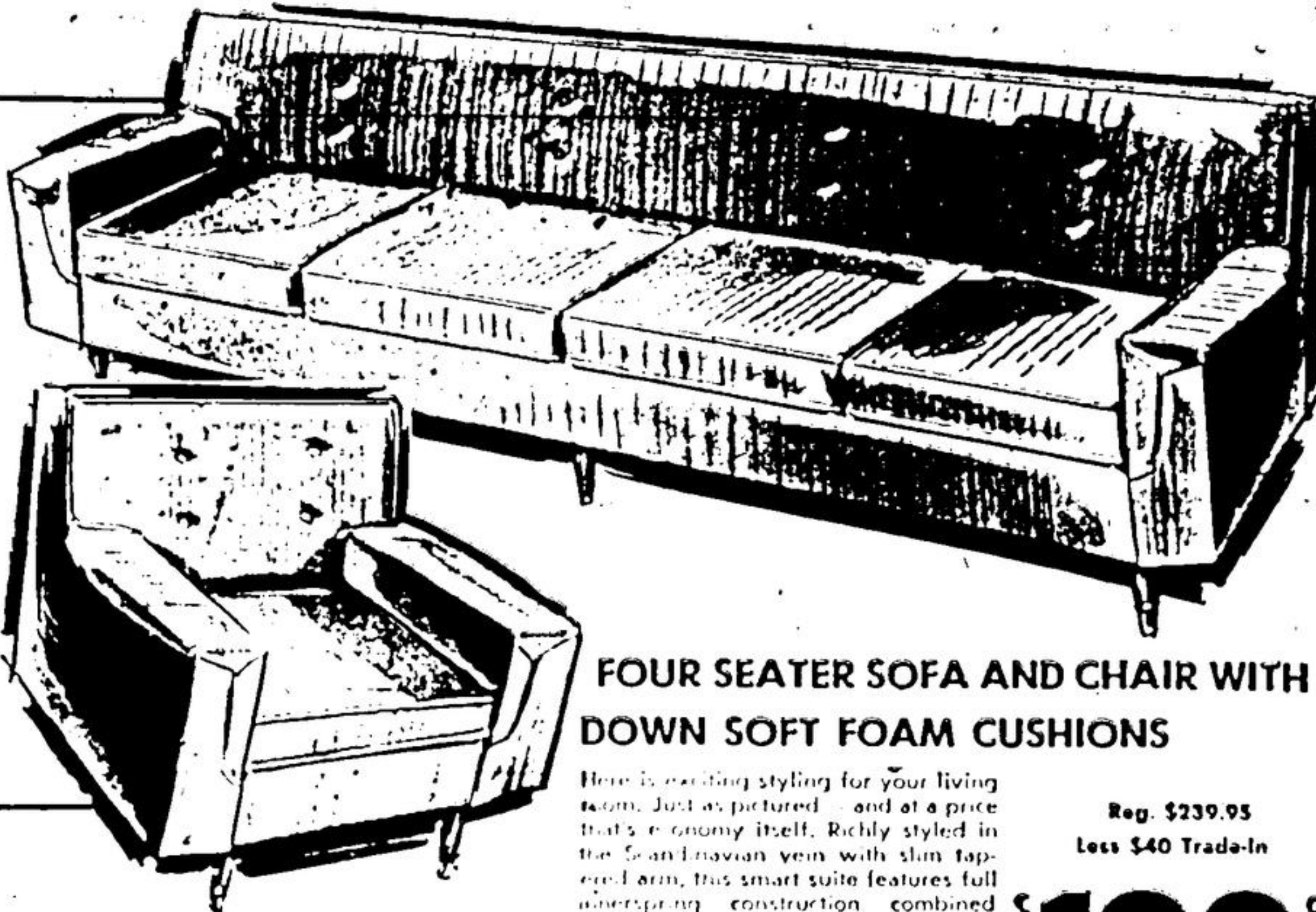
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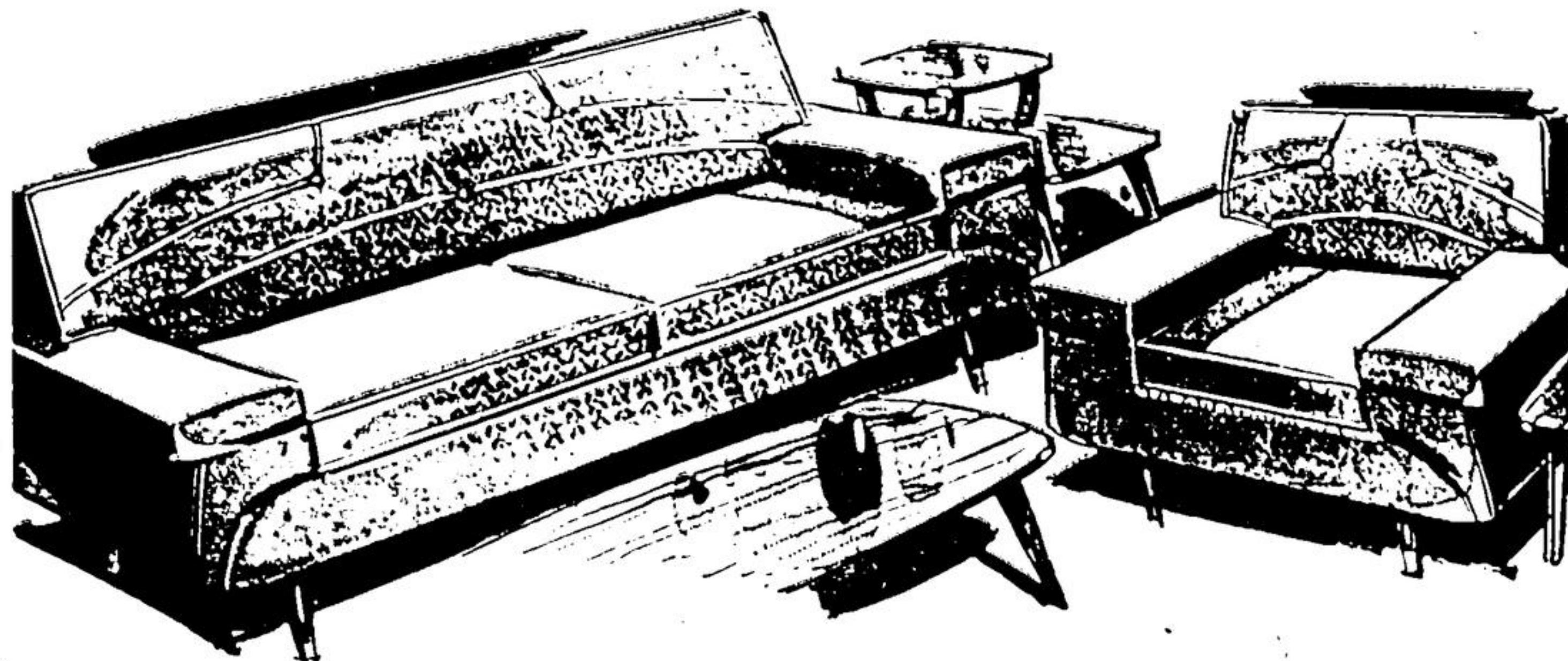
