Ontario Rural Ministers To Attend School Again

Rural Ministers and their families of every denomination from all parts of Ontario will brush up on their knowledge of modern agriculture and rural sociology at the Eleventh Annual School for Rural Clergy, to be held at the Ontario Agricultural College during the last week in July. This is the only school for rural ministers in Canada.

The school, which is directed by Padre W. A. Young, College Chaplain, and Public Relations Officer, will provide instruction in the basic principles of agriculture in relation to human welfare, community life, and the work of the rural church. There will be an opportunity for the disposal of current rural problems and the problem of the rural church in a changing rural society.

The aim of the school is to develop professional leadership in rural communities. Field trips to prominent farms and conservation projects are being planned, as well as a full program of entertainment for the minister and his family.

There will be a Daily Vacation Bible School for the children, and instruction in crafts for the ministers' wives.

The school is planned by an interdenominational committee consisting of representatives of the various churches in the province.

5 Million Claims are Recorded, 45 Years

The Workmen's Compensation Board has announced the receipt of the 5 millionth work claim since the Ontario Workmen's Compensation Act became effective January 1st, 1915.

The five million claims result from accidents arising out of and in the course of employment. The injuries sustained vary in severity from minor cuts and abrasions to extremely serious injuries and death.

W. C. B. Chairman, F. E. Sparrow, emphasized that had it not been for the excellent work of various safety agencies and the co-operation of labour and management, it is quite conceivable that Ontario's 5 millionth claim could have occurred much earlier.

The dubious honour of being the 5 millionth claim goes to a fruit man, Mr. George Galagher. Mr. Galagher was injured on May 4th, 1960, when a hydraulic jack slipped catching his hand between a drive pulley and the jack handle.

The initial report of accident was received at the Board's head office on May 10th, which date is more than 1,100 new claims were recorded.

Comparative figures from the years 1915 and 1959 indicate the growth of the Workmen's Compensation Board.

In 1915, 18,000 industries were covered by the Act and at December 31st that year eight million more than 17,000 work in injuries had been reported to the Board.

In 1959, 195,000 firms covered under the Act numbered 92,297 Workmen protected numbered in excess of one and three quarter million. The number of incidents reported as work injuries in 1959 were 272,460.
