

Proceed with Collection Town Advice to Law Firm

Legal proceedings to collect a \$26,857 account from Delrex Developments will be proceeded with, according to advice from council to the Toronto law firm of Willis & Dingwell.

On Tuesday, council received a letter from the law firm asking council's opinion, in view of the agreement recently reached, in which Delrex has agreed to complete road work in the subdivision.

THAT ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate lying and being in the Township of Esquewing in the County of Halton and Province of Ontario and being composed of part of the East half of Lot 20 in Concession 9 in the said Township of Esquewing as shown on Registered Plan Number 10 on file in the Registry Office for the said County of Halton and known as Reesor's Plan of the Village of Glen Williams in the said Township, containing by admeasurement, all or part of the same more or less and which said parcel of land is more particularly described as follows:

PREMISING that the South westerly limit of Chelton Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10 has a bearing of North 46 deg. 22'00" West and relating all bearings herein thereto:

COMMENCING at the point of intersection of the South westerly limit of Chelton Street with the South easterly limit of Alexander Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10;

THENCE North 36 deg. 08'00" East, along the said South westerly limit of Alexander Street 121.64 feet more or less to the point of intersection of the said South easterly limit of Alexander Street with the South westerly limit of the lands of The Canadian National Railway crossing part of the said Registered Plan Number 10;

THENCE West, along the said Southern limit of the lands of the Canadian National Railway, having a radius of 2784.93 feet a chord distance of 66.89 feet on a chord bearing of North 63 deg. 11'20" West to the point of intersection of the said Southern limit of the lands of the Canadian National Railway with the North westerly limit of Alexander Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10;

THENCE South 26 deg. 08'00" West, along a said North westerly limit of Alexander Street 35.55 feet more or less to the point of intersection of the said North westerly limit of Alexander Street with the North easterly limit of Chelton Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10;

THENCE North 46 deg. 22'00" West, along the said North easterly limit of Chelton Street 100.14 feet more or less to the point of intersection of the said North easterly limit of Chelton Street with the said Southern limit of the lands of the Canadian National Railway;

THENCE West, along the said Southern limit of the lands of the Canadian National Railway, having a radius of 2784.93 feet a chord distance of 179.62 feet on a chord bearing of North 67 deg. 53'20" West to the point of intersection of the said Southern limit of the lands of the Canadian National Railway with the South westerly limit of Chelton Street as shown on said Registered Plan Number 10;

THENCE South 46 deg. 22'00" West, along the said South westerly limit of Chelton Street 340.86 feet more or less to the point of commencement.

Members of the Halton Soil & Crop Improvement Association and those interested in managed pastures will be taking part in a Bus Field Tour, early in June. The tour scheduled for Monday, June 6th, will visit four of the top contestants in the Halton Pasture Competition during the past two years.

The purpose of the tour is to discuss pasture management, field management practices, and discuss the score card for the 1960 Pasture Competition sponsored by the Halton Soil & Crop Improvement Association.

The first stop on the tour will be at the farm of Dr. W. J. McKay, Farm Manager, Jax. McKay was awarded the Gold Watch in 1958, for outstanding management of pastures. The farm of Fred Surrae, 3rd place winner in 1959, will make the second stop. Another farm included in the tour is last year's Gold Watch winner, R. C. Alexander. The final stop on this tour will be the farm of Brock Harris, high contestant for three consecutive years in the Halton Pasture Management Competition.

Some of the items to be noted on the tour include, the use of improved varieties of forage seed, recommended mixtures, rotational grazing, improved pasture on bottom land, fertilization of pastures, effects of harrowing and other features of pasture programme planning.

The bus tour will be under the direction of J. A. Francis, Agricultural Representative for Halton County, Howard Henry, Fieldman, Field Crops Branch, Ontario Department of Agriculture, and J. Norman Bird, judge of Halton's Pasture Competitions for the third consecutive time.
