**Transport Minister to Speak at Terra Cotta**

The Terra Cotta Conservation Area, developed by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, will be officially opened on Tuesday, June 14 at 2:30 p.m. by the Hon. John Yaremko, Q.C., Minister of Transport.

This area of 310 acres near the hamlet of Terra Cotta has been acquired by the Authority to be used to demonstrate a number of conservation projects, including the preservation of a natural source of water, the improvement of fish and wildlife habitat and the management of woodlands.

A portion of the Area will be used for recreation purposes, including picnic sites and hiking trails. There are seven ponds on the area which will provide fishing and one of the largest will furnish swimming and water facilities.

The Credit Valley Authority was established in 1964 and covers an area of 300 square miles including part of four counties from Brantville to Port Credit. Since its inception it has acquired the land for the proposed Orangeville flood control reservoir and created most of it under the water works program. It has acquired in addition to Terra Cotta, three other Conserva-

**4-H Homemaking Clubs Have Achievement Day**

Milk was the feature of the day at Halton County's 4-H Homemaking Clubs Achievement Day held Saturday, May 28 at the Agricultural Hall at the Milton Fair Grounds. During this project, Club Members have learned the importance of milk in the diet and ways of using milk in the family's meals. One hundred and twenty-four cows from the eleven clubs in the County completed the project and exhibited their Record Books containing reports of the club members, recipe files and an individual baked custard to illustrate the practical knowledge they had gained.

During the morning each club member had a chance to exercise some of the powers of judgment she had developed as a result of participating in "The Milky Way." One method of doing this was the completion of a set of menus for farm families considering food value, cost and attractiveness. There were also judging classes of baked custards and a set of farm family menus.

Many mothers and other interested visitors attended the afternoon program when the clubs presented exhibits, demonstrations and skits to illustrate the knowledge they had gained. Women's Institute sponsors of Homemaking Clubs were represented by Mrs. Jas. Wallace, Vice President of the Halton District W. I.

Three exhibits on the topic "Milk for the Convalescent" were presented by the Palermo, Nelson, and Lamehouse Clubs. Commentators were: Marjorie Adams, Anne Bales, and Glenda Benton respectively. The Nelson West, Nassagaweya and Hornby North Clubs chose the topic, "The Milk Bar", and their commentators were: Geraldine Parks, Heather Gates, and Linda Wilson. The girls' comments further explained and contributed to the interest of the exhibits.

The programme of demonstrations and skits began with the Scotch Block Club illustrating "Milk On The Invalid's Tray". Susan Brown and Carol Forbes were the participants. The same topic chosen by the Dublin Club was illustrated by Jean Britton, Barbara Britton, Sandra Blyth, and Mary Moffat. All members of the Hornby South Club took part in their demonstration, "Play Safe With Milk". All members of the Bannockburn Club also took part in their skit illustrating this same topic. **Grant \$7,750 to New Conservation Park**

W. G. Davis, M.P.P. (Pro.) announced today that the Government of Ontario has approved two grants to the Credit Valley Conservation Authority.

The Terra Cotta conservation area, 310 acres in Equestrian and Chancery Townships will receive a government grant of \$7,750.00 (60% of estimated costs) to be developed this year. A change house and refreshment booth will be constructed for visitors to the area while the prime area will be sodded and landscaped. Roadways and parking areas will be travelled. Improvements will also be made to the pond wall and dyke and a dam will be reconstructed at the outlet of the Big Pond.

Mr. Davis also announced that a change house will be built at the Bellmountain Conservation Area at the Forks of the Credit. The Government will contribute 50% of \$100,000 of the costs of this as well as repairs to the stone and concrete dam on the property.

"Bellmountain" Mr. Davis said "was acquired in 1959 by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority and with the addition of the change house, many thousand residents of the area, as well as visitors, should be able to enjoy the site in 1960."

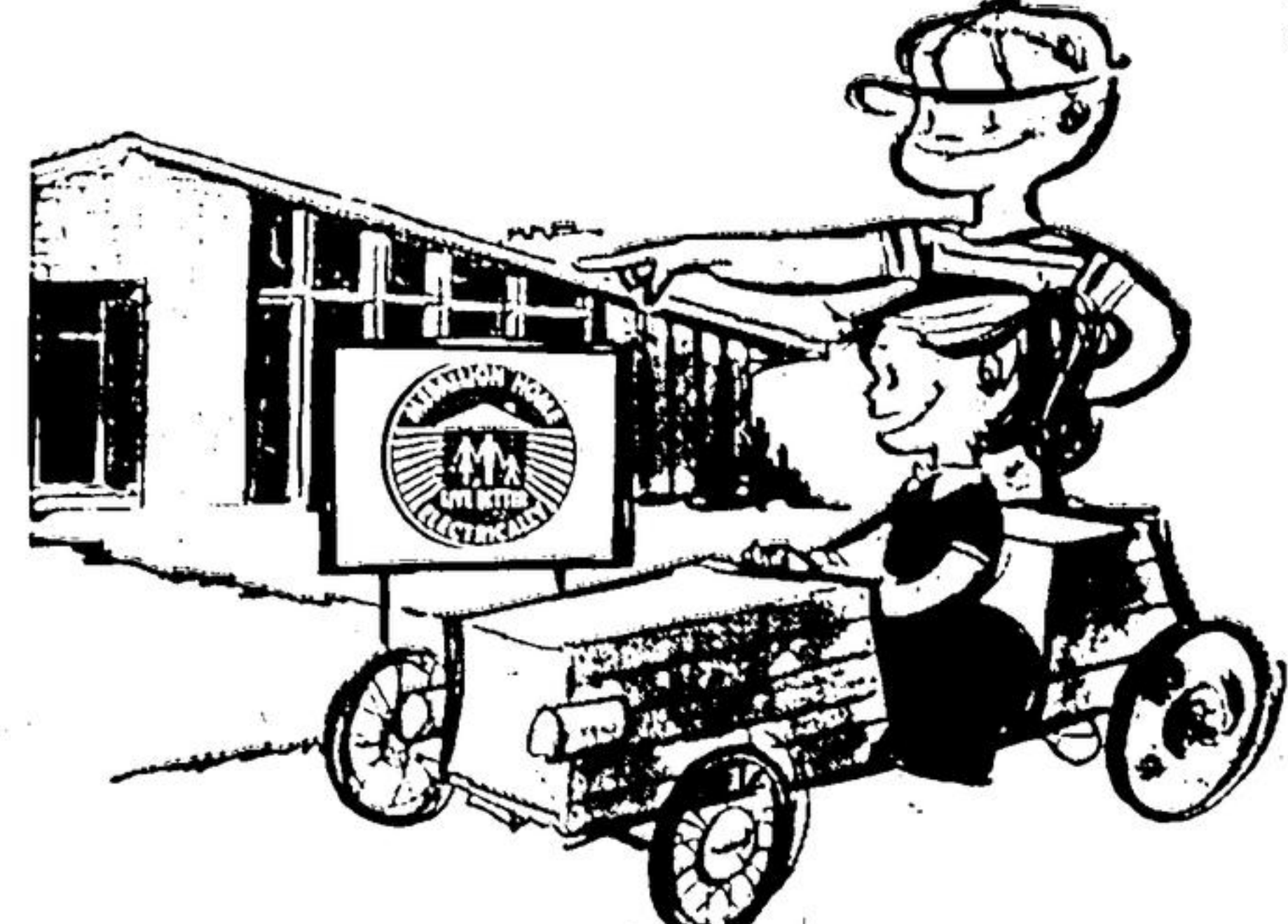
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**CRIPPLED CHILDREN**
