Delrex Firm Version Of Sign Controversy

Dear Mr. Editor:
Following is a copy of a letter sent to the Municipal Council, covering the advertising sign on our property, recently ordered removed.

The Mayor and Members of Council,
Town of Georgetown,
Ontario.

Gentlemen:
In accordance with the order of the Building Inspector pursuant to the motion of your Council of Monday, May 30th, we have taken down the sign which has been the subject of recent controversy.

In our letter to your Council of May 23rd, we expressed our regrets at having overlooked the requirements of the zoning by-law with respect to advertising signs. In any event it would seem that this is not the reason for refusing our application, but rather that the wording of the sign was objectionable.

During the six years that we have been in Georgetown, we have always endeavored to support community activities, including the Chamber of Commerce and the Industrial Commission and have cooperated with the latter body to the best of our ability in promoting the industrial development of the town. We find it hard to understand therefore, why we should not be permitted to publish our association with these two bodies. Surely it must be evident that industrial and commercial prospects will be interested in the knowledge that we, Delrex Developments Limited, as owners of most of

the available land, are coordinating our efforts with both the Chamber of Commerce and the Industrial Commission. The sign was designed to attract potential industries to our town and obviously its removal nullifies one more effort on our part to acquire industry which we thought was to be our common goal.

We shall continue to maintain at our own expense, the large billboard on Toronto's doorstep inducing industry to Georgetown, even though we have been refused the right to do the same thing on Georgetown's doorstep.

Launch Police Public Relations Campaign

The Hon. John Yaremko, Minister of Transport for Ontario, was host to 100 guests at a luncheon the week that concluded the opening of the Department's new Police Public Relations Campaign.

At the luncheon, which was held at the Government Club, and presided over by the Minister, the Minister of Municipal Affairs, the Minister of Provincial and Local Safety Councils, the Minister of Commerce, Women's Clubs and Industry.

The new campaign is designed to foster community support for effective traffic law enforcement. It is a multi-faceted and comprehensive program that will be carried out through a variety of channels.

Georgetown is assured of a university lecture centre following a meeting in Westport, N.Y. which was held last week. The meeting was held at the residence of W. J. McCullough, M.A., director of the extension department, McMaster University.
