Weed Control News

1960 REVISED WEED ACT

Ten years have elapsed since the Ontario Weed Control Act was last revised. This year, however, the Provincial Parliament has enacted certain revisions and amendments which were explained to County Weed Inspectors at a meeting held June 1st at the Ontario Agriculture College, Guelph.

Many of the changes are minor and fairly unimportant to residents, so in this article I will try to describe a few points which may be of interest to people within this area. In reality the 1950 Act has been repealed and replaced by the 1960 Act which I believe is more applicable to growing municipalities such as Halton County.

Administration falls largely on the shoulders of the Ontario Department of Agriculture who in turn appoint inspectors whose responsibilities include enforcement of the Act. They are headed by one referred to as Chief Inspector Mr. A. H. Martin, Director of the Field Crops Branch, Ontario Dept. of Agriculture, Parliament Hill, Toronto. Next in command are District Weed Inspectors whose responsibility it is to oversee the work carried on in a number of counties by County Weed Inspectors appointed by the county and local weed inspectors appointed by the council of a local municipality within a county.

Section 3, subsection (1), states clearly that it is the duty of every citizen to destroy noxious weeds on his or her property as often as every year as is necessary to prevent the spreading of

Had Bake Shop In Palmerston 50 Years

A number of one of Georgetown's oldest street families, Mrs. Albert H. Baird, 96, died in Stratford on May 29th. She was the former Charlotte Jane Baird.

Mrs. Baird was the daughter of John and Isabel McKenzie Bessie and was born near Palmerston on a 5th Line farm. After their death, they moved back to Georgetown, where Mr. Baird died 14 years ago. She then went to Stratford to live for her last years with her daughter, Mrs. D. A. MacNeil.
