WHAT COUNCIL DID

Sign Removal Impediment To Promotion Of Industry: Heslop

Council discussion on a sign-board erected by Delrex Developments and ordered removed last week, ended when a motion to file a letter from Rex Heslop passed with two dissenting votes on Monday.

A letter from Rex Heslop said that in his six years in town, his firm has supported the Chamber of Commerce and Industrial Councils.

"We find it hard to understand why we should not be permitted to publicize our association with these two bodies," he said.

The sign, Mr. Heslop contended, was designed to attract potential industries and its removal nullifies "one more effort on our part to acquire industry which we thought was to be our common goal."

Mr. Heslop's letter ended with pointing out that a large billboard in Toronto will continue to be maintained at company expense even though it has been refused the right to do the same thing on George Street.

The sign was removed following a council request last week which pointed out that it contravened the zoning by-law in location, and was misleading in its wording. Four of the 11 council members, however, voted against the removal request, claiming the matter might better be dealt with by conference with Delrex officials.

There was a brief discussion Monday after reading of Mr. Heslop's letter.

Mayor Hyde expressed the opinion that some answer should be sent the firm.

"We have by-laws to enforce," he said, "but we don't want to be branded as hostile to any effort to get industry."

Mr. Fred Harrison pointed out last week a motion showed council opinion and to answer was necessary, and Deputy Reeve Gray backed him in this opinion.

"This is the lazy way to deal with it," said Cr. Cass. "Delrex is right in saying it was the wording, not the location we objected to. We should give the firm some idea of what wording would be acceptable."

Mr. Cass said if the type size indicated the firm is a manufacturer of the two organizations were not out of proportion with the rest of the sign, it would not be objectionable.

Mayor Hyde pointed out that Delrex must be cautious as there were other signs in town that have been ordered removed.

"If they wish to put up another sign and come to see us they will receive consideration," said Deputy Reeve Gray as he seconded a Hunter motion to file the letter. Crs. Cass and Gunn voted against the filing. Reeve, Sargent, who had opposed the removal request last week, was absent from the meeting.
