WHAT COUNCIL DID ... Passenger Train To Hamilton To Be Discontinued In July

Passenger service on the Alandale-Hamilton CNR line through town will cease effective July 3rd, it was learned at Monday council meeting.

The city council protested to the Board of Railway Commissioners suspending action in suspending the non-profitable service. On Monday a letter from the board confirmed the CNR decision which will lead to a \$40,000 saving in operations.

The letter, pointed out that an average of 11 northbound passengers and 7 southbound use the train daily, that alternate transportation is available and that adequate service for express and mail will be maintained by the company.

Inconvenience to a few passengers is overruled by the financial savings involved, the letter said, and the CNR will be allowed to suspend service on July 3rd.

Permission was granted the Police Athletic Association to operate a portable refreshment booth in the park, to serve during ball games and other activities.

The town will foot a \$250 bill for painting white centre lines on the highway through town, work to be done by the highways department.

Parkers on Main St. will now have an extra free hour in the mornings.

The parking meter charge will not come into effect until 9 a.m., following a by-law amendment. Formerly meters were in operation from 8 a.m.

The Lorne Scots band was granted permission to hold a band concert in the park on the first Sunday afternoon in September. The Hospital Association received an okay for a tag day to coincide with fall fair days, Sept. 30 and Oct. 1st. Asking adequate policing for their street dance in the Delroy Market Centre this Saturday, Club Midtown was advised that the police department will arrange this.

"With criticism sometimes that young people do not cooperate with the police, it is good to see that the Midtowners appreciate police service, and they should be commended," remarked Cr. Ian Cass.

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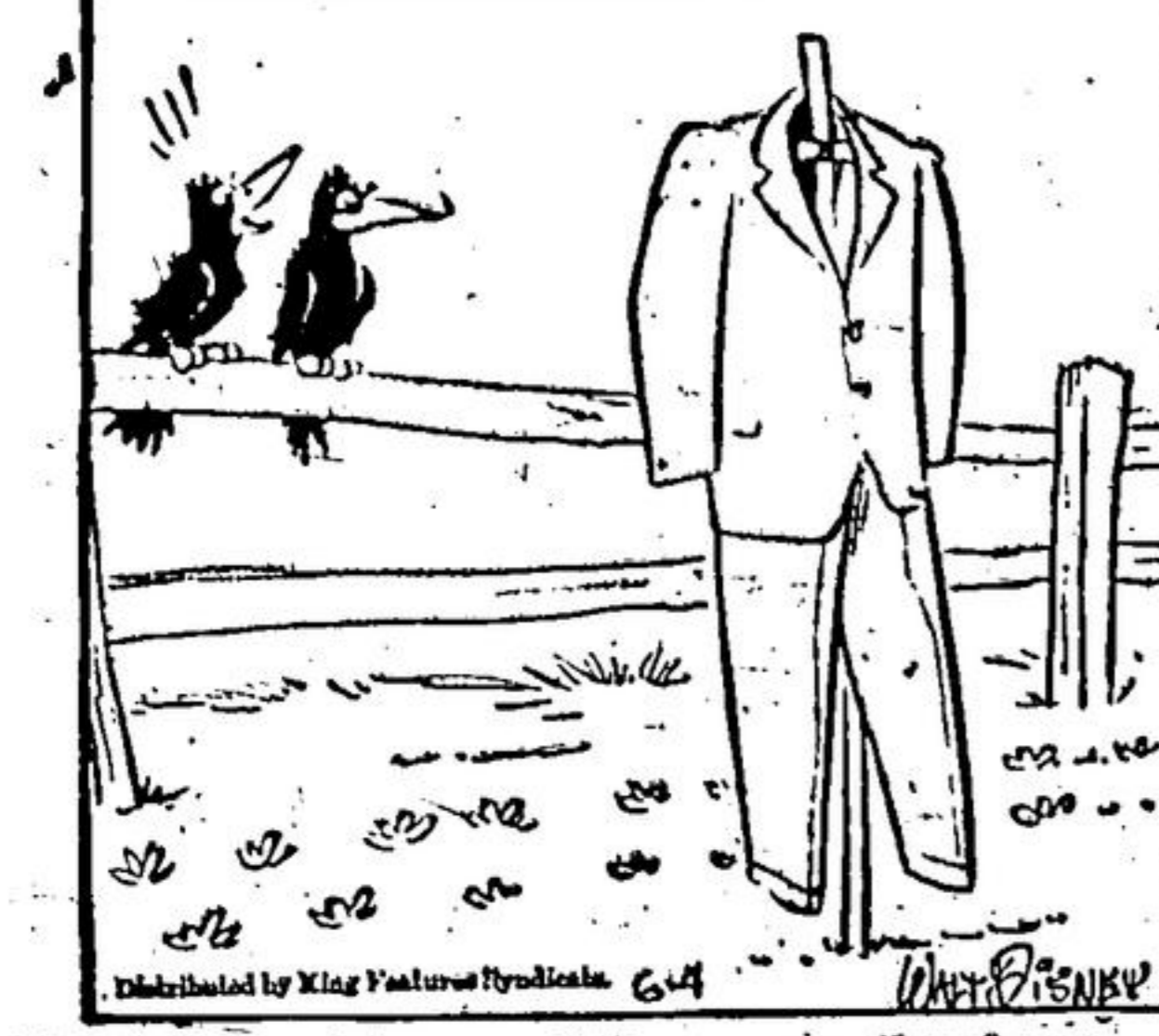
Niagara District is Toured by Grade 8
