**Delrex Explains Why Sewage Road Blocked**

The Editor, The Georgetown Herald, Georgetown, Ont.

Dear Sir: At Council meeting on Monday last, Councillor Harrison implied that I was deliberately holding up construction of the new disposal plant. Not long ago the same Councillor Harrison was accusing me of applying pressure for the construction of a new disposal plant against the wishes of the Town and which the Town did not require. Obviously, Mr. Harrison is very interested in attacking me on any and every occasion without regard to the facts.

With a view to clarifying the situation I would like to review the events leading up to the present situation.

When the Ontario Water Resources Commission was negotiating for a site for the new plant I decided them ten acres for a nominal sum and granted an easement for the width of the valley for the trunk sewer, free of charge. Because of tentative plans for a dam at the Ninth Lane, and the fact that the lands on the south side of the river have not yet been planned for development, it was not possible to establish a permanent location for an access road. However I did agree to allow temporary access supported by a commitment to deed land for a permanent road of 30 feet when its location had been determined.

When the construction contract was awarded, the superintendent of the contractor called on me to arrange for the temporary access. He was requested to examine the land and lay out his proposed route which was to be referred back to me for approval. On the contrary, he did not consult with me again but proceeded to make a road of 100 feet wide into the property cutting into valuable land and creating erosion problems in the process. After the damage had been done, the Commission applied for an easement over the property which had already been destroyed and which I was not willing to approve.

As a matter of interest I have been in almost constant communication with the Chairman of the Commission during the past week and he agrees that there was no justification for the destruction which has been caused. Furthermore, I anticipate that the matter will be resolved satisfactorily with in the very near future.

In closing may I suggest that it must be evident to every person of intelligence that, as owner of the land through which the polluted Silver Creek now flows, I am certainly most interested in seeing this pollution cleaned up as soon as possible and this can only be accomplished by proceeding with the disposal plant with all speed. On the other hand I do not feel that I should be expected to permit willful trespass and destruction without complaint.

**School Children Competition To Name New Memorial Park**

A contest to name the new Georgetown park where the war memorial is located will be sponsored by the Canadian Legion branch.

Request of the branch for a naming contest, open to the public school age children in town and district, was accepted to be council Monday when branch president Dave Capperauld and Alex Taylor brought the idea to council.

As a contribution to the new park, the Legion will install six benches which will have memorial plaques.

Resolving of a triangle of land owned by Dominion Seed House from industrial to agricultural use was passed, on recommendation of the Planning Board.

Another motion reversed a previous decision to change the Wilson property at the Maple Highway corner to commercial from its present residential status. The property is under option by Loblaw's and has been rezoned as the site of a new post office.

The motion, which was opposed by Mayor Hyde and Councillors Harrison and Hunter, followed a recommendation by the Community Planning Branch of the government that no change be made in zoning of the property. Mayor Hyde argued that more study should be given before a prior decision was overruled. Councillor Harrison said he does not think land should be rezoned because of pressure from a commercial organization which would increase the land value, and reiterated his opposition to "strip zoning".

Warned by a letter from Sam Mackenzie that he would take legal action if the town should sell a property on James St. which was originally given to the town by his father for a park and wading pool, council decided to get advice from the town solicitor about the town's position.

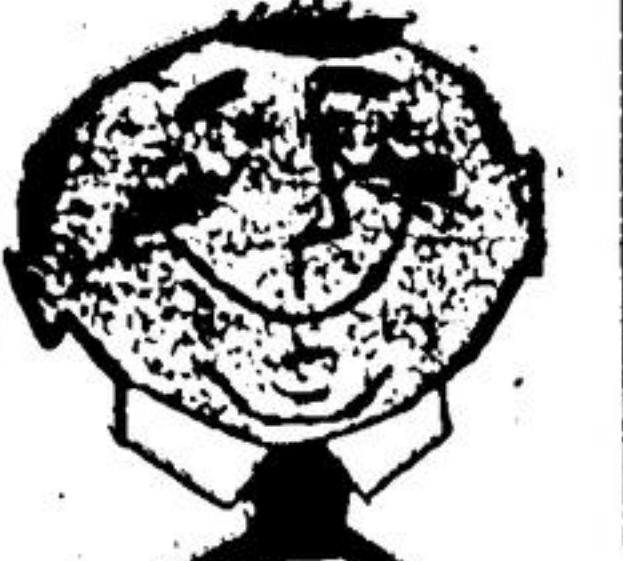
