WHAT COUNCIL DID

Award Tender For \$15,000 Road Surfacing In Town

One of three firms from which bids had been invited for local road work, Peel Construction was granted a contract for prime, seal and chip on a number of town roads at Monday's council meeting. The tender, lowest of the three, is for \$14,875. Asking about progress on roads in Delrex East, Mayor Hyde was told by town engineer Bligh that he and William Carr, representing the Delrex firm, would be consulting the highways department this week about the depth of gravel which would be required on the roads. "What about the \$26,857 payable by Delrex in January?" asked Cr. John Elliott. Cr. Elliott said a report from a Toronto law firm had been asked in March and still no word has been received. The town clerk was asked to have the firm report next week. The new hospital will pay double water rates because it is located out of town limits, according to a council motion which asked water and sewage hook-ups for the building.

Discuss Moving Anglican Cemetery To Hillcrest

Many councils have been accused of dealing only with dead issues, but this week Esquimaux Council really dealt with one — the old cemetery in Norval beside the Anglican Church. Reeve Cam Sinclair told council of a request to have a memorial stone removed to the new cemetery. The stone belongs to a family in Galt. "Why should they ask us?" demanded Councillor George Leslie. "It belongs to the Anglican Church." "They say they are unable to keep it up," replied Coun. W. Linham. "We can only force them to keep fences in shape, and the weeds cut," added Clerk K. C. Lindsay. "Well, do we take over the cemetery or not?" Reeve Sinclair asked. The move suggested the few good stones be set up in a cleared area next to Hillcrest Cemetery, and a cairn made of the others. Rather ironically Councillor Wilfred Leslie commented, "That cemetery sure looks like the devil." Council decided to go and look over the scene, then get an estimate of the cost involved. A legal opinion on the situation will also be sought. There won't be many war time houses in Esquimaux, according to the consensus of opinion of the council members. Building Inspector William Hulla, told of five war time houses which have been moved from Kipling Ave. at the Six Points in Toronto, to Esquimaux. A business and engineering firm has bought the lot. Mr. J. Cross has bought later Robert McCumber and David Farnell another group. Suddenly, after suffering a heart attack James Elliot Peterkin died at his home, 14 Market Street on June 14th at the age of eighty-six.
