Seek Explanation From OWRC For Sewer Contract Hold-Back

Claim Sub-Contractors Losers In Bankruptcy

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Criticism of the handling of the connecting sewer to the new disposal plant by the Ontario Water Resources Commission was expressed at Monday's council meeting by Cr. Fred Harrison.

Cr. Harrison said some local sub-contractors have not been paid since the firm which had the sewer line contract went bankrupt and he does not think OWRC had enough hold-back to protect them.

"I found out some things today which I think are irregular, and I'd like to get the story firsthand from an OWRC man," said Cr. Harrison, asking that the commission send a representative to next week's meeting.

Mr. Proctor of the Proctor & Bedford engineering firm was at the meeting, and in answer to a question by Mayor Hyde said his firm knows nothing more than it did a week ago as to how an access roadway across Delrex Developments property, barred for a few weeks, had been opened again. Mr. Proctor said the OWRC chairman had said at a meeting that he would discuss reopening the road with Rex Heslop, and that he does not know the outcome of the negotiations.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Volunteer Ambulance Drivers Are Now Covered By Insurance

Insurance coverage for volunteer ambulance drivers, long sought by council and the GVAS, was accomplished on Monday when a policy was taken out with the London & Lancashire firm through the local John R. Barber Agency.

Ambulance chief Ed Hall appeared before council with Murray Housley of the Barber firm to explain that inquiries from several insurance firms a year ago about a proposed home development of Ontario St. by the Ontario St. Development Co. had been refused.

The GVAS has been worried about the accident risk to volunteers who cannot be covered under existing Workmen's Compensation legislation. Until changes are made in the legislation the only possibility of government protection is by a private member's bill. The policy will cost the town \$50 per man yearly for the 90-man brigade. Members will receive \$10,000 life insurance, \$1,000 in medical costs, above the Ontario Hospital Insurance, and a weekly indemnity of \$50 for 104 weeks should a man be incapacitated by accident. Government protection is only when a man is on duty for the GVAS.

Loaves of three invited bids for constructing a pump-house at No. 3 water well, the tender of W. B. Hamilton Construction, Ltd. for \$7,309 was accepted.

Finding that when the contract was placed in its new location that it was facing in a position which a majority of councillors did not favour, council agreed to have it swung around to face the corner of James and Church Sts. Extra cost for the job will be \$200.

Town engineer Bligh was asked to prepare a sketch and cost estimate for a suggestion by the Community Centre Association that a storage area and dressing room be built under the playground.

The association also wants a place to display trophies and it was suggested that the area might be the proper place for this.

Name Former Chairman School Board Secretary

A Provincial Mill employee and former board chairman, Ernest Longrave, will succeed H. Col. Brown as secretary of the Georgetown and District High School Board when Col. Brown retires from the post some time this fall.

Mr. Longrave's application was chosen from four at a special meeting of the board earlier this month. Col. Brown who threatened to resign if the board favoured assisting financially teachers taking specialist courses, at a previous regular meeting, made the recommendation official at the May assembly in the high school board room when he announced it before the board.

The veteran secretary later expressed his desire to stay with his duties until the first of October to deal with complications which arose out of the construction of the new building.

Other business at the special meeting included the acceptance of a tender for painting the classrooms which were added to the original building in 1954. The board selected the bid of J. G. Farlow of Milton, \$847.37.

Georgetown High School's enrollment will surpass the 800 mark in 1963 according to a projected estimate made by principal J. L. Lambert at the meeting. The present registration stands at 482.

Minor irregularities in parts of the new structure were discussed with Mr. Barnett of the architect firm of Barnett and Rieder who sat in on the meeting at the board's request. An uncompleted drain, apparently off the school roof, missing keys to two outdoor fountains, reversed connections on a hot water tank, a faulty door locking mechanism and shallow puddling on the wide walk at the buildings entrance, were the vexations which Mr. Barnett promised would be righted during the summer.

Offer \$15,000 Equipment, Too If Town Negotiates On Debt

In return, the firm is prepared to grant a deed for the pump station property and turn over the \$15,000 in equipment on hand.

After hearing the letter, Cr. Fred Harrison claimed the town has received no deed from Delrex for any of the 5% land required from subdividers for town use.

"I asked Mr. Hewson to find out if the lift station property is part of the 5% and this letter is the answer," he said.

Mr. Harrison said it is not customary for unauthorized work to be done for the town and a bill submitted later. And the taxes owed have nothing to do with the price of the disposal plant land at all, he continued.

"What Mr. Heslop says about political capital may have a certain ring of truth," commented Cr. Ian Cass, "and this problem would be solved that way. Our problem is that we want the lift station land."

Mr. Cass said nothing is accomplished by either council or Delrex Developments "standing on their high horse" at the same time, he does not think the land requirement should be used as a lever to manoeuvre council into an "untenable position."

Mr. Cass said council should approach the land owners again on a land price, and might consider also purchase of material on hand which could be used for the lift station.

"I hope we can pursue the matter further without any more muddling or political capital," he concluded.

Mayor Hyde said council cannot legally enter into any of the negotiations the letter mentioned.

"We are willing to negotiate for the land but not to bargain on some of the points in the letter," he said.

Cr. Harrison then said that if council could meet in committee later that evening, he had an idea which he would like to work on.

"I can't mention it in an open meeting because news flies," he said, intimating that his idea might entail an expenditure of up to \$300 which a committee chairman is not empowered by which the firm offered to make up in cash any deficiency in the 60-40 ratio when more councilors remained for the land was released for housing committee meeting.

Mr. Heslop detailed costs of sewer and water mains paid for by his firm at some \$13,374; pumping station costs at \$13,829 plus over \$15,000 equipment on hand for the pump station.

He suggested that the \$48,000 liquidation of our unpaid 1959 taxes and the account outstanding under the agreement of April 14, 1958 (An agreement which the firm offered to make up in cash any deficiency in the 60-40 ratio when more councilors remained for the land was released for housing committee meeting.)
