Witnesses Plan Attendance At Toronto Convention

Mr. George Bradford, presiding minister of the local congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses announced today that all Jehovah's Witnesses from Georgetown and district who will be attending the four day convention of Jehovah's Witnesses in Toronto this weekend have been assured rooming accommodation during the convention. All ready the response of hotel managers, motel and rooming house operators, and particularly Toronto housewives, has assured comfortable accommodations for the more than 25,000 delegates expected at Mr. Bradford.

In obtaining 3,025 rooms in hotels and motels and 8,411 in private homes, Witness ministers from 52 congregations in Toronto and vicinity spent 16,137 hours during the past four weeks in climbing stairs and knocking on the doors of Toronto homes and professional hostesses. A staff of 52 full time volunteers has been required to process the accommodations and assign them to delegates.

"Contributing primarily to the success of our solicitation was the reaction of hosts and hostesses to the 1957 convention delegates," commented Mr. Bradford. "The exemplary conduct of the Witnesses was remembered and people went out of their way to again provide them with rooms. Some even insisted on supplying free accommodation for our missionaries and full time ministers while hotel and motel management smiled with relief when told it was a Witness convention that was coming. Already delegates from 28 states, 8 provinces, and the Island of Haiti are now represented."

It is expected that upward of 500 new Witness ministers will be ordained by water baptism during the convention.

Mr. Bradford in announcing the plans of the local delegates, said that it has been necessary to cancel all meetings in the Kingston Hall for this weekend, due to all being away for the Christian Assembly.

The yellow helmeted crew over the past two weeks have installed most of the 7,000 feet of conduit and 3,000 feet of cable.

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New Assistant Medical Officer Joins Halton County Health Unit

Doctor A. P. Bull, as Director of the Halton County Health Unit, announces the appointment by the Board of Health of Halton County, of Dr. Alan S. Taylor of Hamilton as Assistant Medical Officer of Health.

Doctor Taylor has been on the staff of the Mountain Sanatorium during 1957, 1958 and 1959. He has recently successfully completed a public health course at the School of Hygiene, University of Toronto. He will be taking up his new duties on July 11.

Tuberculin Skin Tests To Be Extended Next Year For Students

Tuberculin skin testing of the high school students at the Blakelock and Oakville-Trafalgar High Schools, was carried out during March, April and May. This was the initial start of a county wide skin testing program for high school students.

The project was undertaken by the Halton County Tuberculosis Association, the Provincial Department of Health and the Ontario Tuberculosis Association, together with local private physicians who also co-operated in this project. 1401 students were tested, 167 were found to have positive skin tests. 60 staff members were also skin tested. All individuals with positive skin tests have had chest x-rays and no cases of tuberculosis have been discovered. The families of positive students are being followed up by their family physicians with skin tests and chest x-rays.

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Old Fire Well Recalls Tragedy Of Drowning

Par Tex construction work men laying cable for the Bell Telephone Company struck history last week in one of their excavations opposite Knox Presbyterian Church.

Progress in that end of the street was halted briefly when diggers uncovered an old stone and plaster well, one of many which reportedly dotted the town around the turn of the century. Mr. Fred McNally who notified the Herald of the find said the wells were used primarily for fire protection.

The re-discovery recalled to Mr. McNally a tragic story surrounding the well involving a young boy with the last name

of Fisher. The lad who had in part of the tripod opposite the Knox Church on Main St. fell into the well and was drowned the night of a Christmas concert in the church basement.
