**Scout Council Purchases 26 Acre Campsite In Hillsburgh Region**

Twenty-six acres of nature — trout ponds, trees and rugged terrain — will soon be a second home to Georgetown Scouts and Cubs.  
The outdoorsman's paradise, has been purchased by the Georgetown and District Scout Council finance committee as a camp site it was disclosed this week. The committee purchased the land through Noel Reynolds of the Keith Real Estate for \$8000.  
The site is located a mile west of Hillsburgh and was part of Pleasant Valley Farm owned by H. Wheeler and in his possession since 1924. Seventeen wooded acres, and four ponds fed by two naturally stocked trout streams offer ideal swimming, fishing and other recreational facilities available via a 33 foot deeded access road off Cedar Valley Road. An adjacent thirty acres is a possible future addition.  
The camp site requires some development by the Scouts but the council are pleased with the transaction which they feel fills a long lamented gap in the Scout and Cub recreational facilities. The site is about eighteen miles north of town.

**Highway Dept. Offers 15c a Foot For Land Frontage At Silvercreek**

An offer from the Dept. of Highways to purchase land owned by the town on two sides of the highway at Silvercreek for a highway widening project was turned over to council's property committee at Monday's meeting.  
The Dept. offered \$100 for the half acre of land, and said it would also relocate water lines if necessary.  
The land is part of the property acquired many years ago for a water reservoir.  
Council was surprised to find that the town owns land on the far highway side from the reservoir.  
"They're paying 15c a foot," estimated Cr. Fred Harrison, who said council has a motion on the books that any town land for sale must be advertised and offered to the highest bidder.  
Mayor Hyde said he thought this would be a special case. They might turn around and sell the property for \$8,000 later. I read about one like that in the Star," said Cr. Harrison, who said the question of a new road approach to the reservoir should be examined before any deal is made.

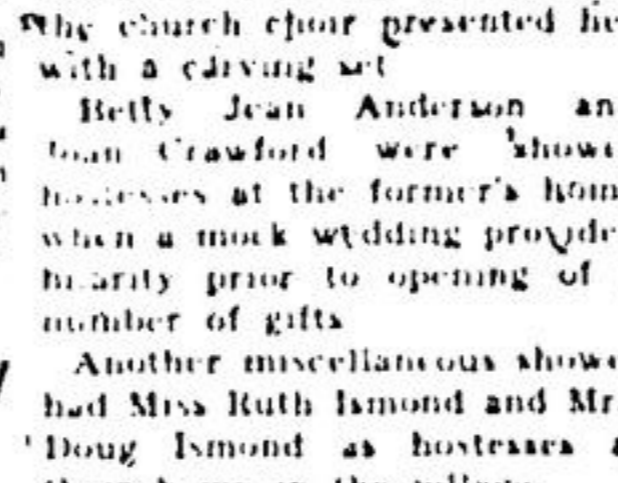
