# Diary of a Vagabond BY DOROTHY BARKER

My boss is a thoroughly masculine person with a truly feminine kind of intuition. He always seems to know when my two itchy feet have trod the home boards long enough. Then the telephone rings and a long distance operator waves her magic wand and a familiar voice says, "How would you like to travel up to Ottawa?" Understand that the new mall is creating considerable comment.

The capital, as it should, has shown leadership in giving the tourist a three month's "try-out" is important, not only to Canada's National railway, but to merchants and trades people as well, right across the Dominion. New ideas are essential if we would attract tourists from outside our borders and keep our own tourist dollars at home.

When my train arrived it was a relief not to feel like a load under a narrow wheel crossing the street in the trafficless area. I felt like a small child who had suddenly been given permission to play in the middle of the road. Without turning a hair, I found I could wander from the little book shop that has garnered more dollars for paperbacks from my literature budget than any other shop in the city. I have visited since I became a vagabond, across the street to gaze covetously at a shop window crammed with feminine apparel for summer wear. Sparks Street, between Edgin and Banks Streets, for three months will be a pedestrian shopper's paradise.

With the hope that this mall will prove the competitive answer to shopping plazas and give downtown merchants an even break for the buyer's dollar, Ottawa has spent \$30,000 on an experiment.

And what a delightful experiment! Colour, atmosphere, and customer comfort were the amount of considerations in the planning of this undertaking. Flowers bloom in profusion and small trees grow in huge concrete tubs right in the heart of the city. Bright yellow benches lure weary potential purchasers to rest a bit between visits to shops in the area.

Perhaps it is because Ottawa, such a cosmopolitan atmosphere, it made the sidewalk cafes seem intrinsically a part of the picture. The sound of French, typical of the capital's conversational pattern, gave the outdoor cafe idea an added allure. For a continent-bound traveller such as myself, my days of having been transported in seconds to Paris during the tourist dollar has become big business since the culmination of the last war. It is a terribly important facet of our national economy. It seems to me that the promoters had their tongues in the cheeks when they endorsed the experiment. I took the trouble to talk to native Ottawans. What did they think of the idea? Without exception they all made the same remark: "Sure dresses up the old burg." The women were all in favour, while the men smiled tolerantly and said "Makes the coffee break a bit more romantic."

Calgary and Victoria, it is said, have their eyes on the project. Ottawa may be acting as a guinea pig but hats off to those persons who had enough imagination to believe that Toledo's shopping mall could be repeated this side of the international border.
