#### Adopt New Name For Retarded Children Group

"Two giant steps forward"  
was how G. Addison, Presi-  
dent of the Milton & District  
Association for Retarded Child-  
ren described the action taken  
at a special meeting of the As-  
sociation held on Tuesday,  
June 28th.

Two motions were passed  
which clearly what has been a  
problem of some concern in To-  
ronto. The first motion was to  
fully explain the significance of  
the two motions," continued  
Mr. Addison, we should re-  
view the history of the Associa-  
tion, briefly. The Milton and  
District Association was found-  
ed in 1955 and was originally  
based on the requirements to  
serve Milton and immediate  
territory. As the years passed,  
we added children from Acton  
and later from North York.  
We have been more and more con-  
scious in other words that we  
are serving a much larger area  
than "Milton & District". In  
1958 a group of residents from  
Georgetown headed by Mrs.  
Ernest Hall became very inter-  
ested in our work and joined  
with us. This year (1960) two  
members of our Executive are  
from Georgetown, Mr. Andrew  
Miller, 2nd Vice-President and  
Mrs. Hall, serving her second  
year on the Ontario Board of  
Directors.

The ultimate goal of the work  
in this area has often been dis-  
cussed and the policy has gradu-  
ally developed that one strong  
school to serve north Halton  
would be much more desirable  
than two or three smaller  
schools. There are Retarded  
in every area and they must be  
served.

The meeting on Tuesday  
night confirmed that our mem-  
bership agree with the execu-  
tive and a motion was passed  
which reads in effect that a  
site will be chosen which will  
be centrally located, that the  
retarded of all North Halton can  
be served in one location.

The second motion was a  
natural outgrowth of the first  
in that if we are to serve North  
Halton we should change our  
name to North Halton Children.  
The request to amend our char-  
ter to this extent will be going  
to O.A.R.C. for approval im-  
mediately. This means that  
every resident of North Halton  
(The area from Highway 54 to  
the Northern boundary, except-  
ing Burlington) can justifiably  
feel that this effort is their con-  
cern and it is not localized to  
one town, township or area in  
the County.

Concluded Mr. Addison, "We  
feel that this action is going to  
do the most good for our re-  
tarded citizen and after all that  
is the main purpose of our As-  
sociation's existence." Mr. Stan  
Hall, M.P.P. attended the meet-  
ing.
