Cards 81 in Qualifier But Local Golf Pro "Out"

A 9 over par 81 failed to carry Georgetown Golf and Country Club pro Jim Burton past the initial Canadian Open qualifying round at the St. George's course in Toronto Monday.

Jim, who played in a three-some with Hugh Patterson of St. George's and Alvin Thompson of Northwood Golf, ran into trouble on the 7th after birdying the 6th to stand at par. The twenty-two year pro encountered difficulty again on the 10th where he used three strokes in escaping a sand trap. He birdied the 11th but faltered again on the 14th, to

take a double bogey. Though not good enough to qualify, his 81 was envied by dozens of other entrants who were completely stymied by the tough course.

Patterson, an amateur finished with a rare 74 and was one of four Canadians who qualified. This is the first year since the start of the Canadian Open that an unexpectedly large registration has forced two qualifying rounds. The second was held yesterday.

DOES ROAD RACING THRILL YOU?

Did you ever have the urge to put your foot right down to the floor and let the old bugs go? Odds are you've felt like this. Now you can enjoy all the thrills of racing without any risk. What's more, the wife and children can get into the act, too. How? Karting, that's how. Karting is the new craze that is sweeping the country. A kart is a simple steel frame with four small wheels spaced wide to lessen risk of overturning, a lawn mower type motor and a steering wheel. Add a crash helmet for safety and away you go.

It started in the United States in 1956 and is now the fastest-growing sport in the world. The United States has over 300,000 karts and 400 tracks. Though the sport only caught on in Canada last year, there are now over 5,000 karts and 40 tracks in this country. Canadian manufacturers expect to sell 30,000 karts this summer.

Though karts can be bought for as little as \$150, manufacturers produce do-it-yourself kits for even less. Jimmy Yamone, who became World Go Kart champion by beating the famed Stirling Moss in Nassau last December, won the championship in a go kart he built himself to his own specifications.

One of go-karting's main attractions is that it is a family sport. The pre-teenager, too young to get a road license, can learn how to handle a car in safety. The teenager can burn off that excess energy often expended on the highway. The woman of the house can have a grand time, with no fenders to bend and no back-seat drivers. For father, there are always some repairs to be made.

The North Halton Kart Club, with headquarters in Georgetown is the first chartered private club in Canada. The club maintains high standards as karts must conform to rigid rules for power and safety. They are not allowed to be driven on highways or in public places.

One word of caution. If you are at all doubtful, don't try one out. One ride and you're hooked.

The North Halton Kart Club will hold a lucky draw on Saturday, July 9th, at the North Halton Kartway, on the 5th line, 1 mile south of Limehinge. The program begins at 7 p.m.
