Meadowlen Growers, a name well known in the community, will be known henceforth as Meadowlen Mushroom Growers Ltd. The business has been acquired by a four man partnership consisting of Mr. M. Skrow, his son Mr. Ernie Skrow, his brother Mr. Sam Skrow and his brother-in-law Mr. Mac Cohen.

They have been in the produce business in Toronto for forty years. From Kenneth Square, Pennsylvania, they have brought Mr. Tony Delaureris, an expert in this field.

"We are all very pleased with the help given us by Georgetown officials, and hope to continue the friendship." He also stressed the fact that any work to be done, will be done by local men.

A grand opening will be held after they are thoroughly settled. Mr. Tony Delaureris will live in town right away, and the others plan to move to town later.

Georgetown's mushroom industry began in 1940 when a farm situated between the 9th, 10th and the Smith & Stone property was purchased by a group of three men, R. H. Jones, William Anderson and Dr. R. McKibbin. A year later, George Fawcett joined the firm, Dr. McKibbin, who now lives in Ottawa, left the firm in 1947, and the three men have carried on as partners since then.

As business grew, new mushroom houses were added and to present the plant has 23 of these.
