# Antique Cars Visit Town Enroute From London To Brighton

Once-familiar sounds of a bygone era echoed through the streets of town Tuesday morning when such proud automobiles as Gray-Dort, McLaughlin-Buick, Rucke and Willys Knight took part in the fourth annual London to Brighton Tour of antique and classic cars.

The tour was conducted by the Antique and Classic Car Club of Canada and sponsored by British American Oil. It commemorated the original London to Brighton tour in England, driven annually since 1904, celebrating the repeal of the "Fog Law" which required that a runner, carrying a red flag by day and a red lantern by night, precede each horse-drawn carriage to warn pedestrians.

Two dozen cars, ranging in age from a 1911 Model T Ford to a 1937 Buick, in London, Ontario, on Sunday, July 10, to receive final instructions and to add last minute touches of "yellow grease" to the already gleaming metal of the antique.

Monday morning the entourage cranked up and set out on the first leg of the 300-mile trip which took the cars through Stratford and Kitchener to Guelph for an overnight stop. The following day the group passed through Georgetown, Brampton, the northern outskirts of Toronto and on to Peterborough for the second night's rest. The final day saw the tour enter Brighton en masse for a parade and official ceremonies at the finish line. It then proceeded to Port Hope for the wind up parade and banquet.

Some of the entries in the tour included a 1917 Cadillac from Caledonia, Ont. a 1923 French Darracq Tourer from Toronto, and a 1931 Chev Cabriolet from St. Catharines. Two U.S. participants included a 1923 Chev Tourer from Grechard Park, New York, and a classic 1940 Buick Royale P III from Rochester, N.Y.
