Linda is a granddaughter of the great producing cow, Avonlea Records Suzanna, classified Excellent, who produced in 10 lactation periods, 119,025 lbs. of milk, and 6,991 lbs. of fat, and stands second in Canada for living long distance fat producers. She is busy adding to her record.
