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Garbage Fires Annoying Must Stop, Says Council

Burning garbage in the land fill area in the river flats near lower Main St. has caused a flood of complaints from ratepayers, said Mayor Hyde in bringing the matter to council's attention Monday.

The mayor said garbage has caught on fire three weeks in a row, and that under a sanitary land fill agreement with the garbage contractor, this should not happen.

Cr. Fred Harrison opined that he had been near the site when the garbage caught fire last Friday and that it was some form of combustion as no one else was in the area.

"The fire travelled so fast it was impossible to get a bulldozer in to cover it for some time," said the councillor. "Can't someone be delegated to see it doesn't catch fire before it's covered," asked Cr. John Elliot.

Cr. Ian Cass said he is getting complaints all the time and that the town engineer should keep an eye on the site.

A letter was read which had been sent by engineer Blight pointing out that garbage must be covered nightly.

Complaint by R. E. Kelly, 4 Stevens, Creve of weeds on vacant lots was turned over to the weed inspector. Mr. Kellythorne pointed out that ragweed is particularly prevalent in the area and should be controlled for hay fever sufferers.

Delinquent taxes will be discussed at a Finance committee meeting this week.

Meanwhile Cr. John D. Kelly suggested that drafts be drawn on taxpayers who are in arrears as a means of bringing in some of the arrears.

Answering a letter which asked about details of the opening of an access road to the new sewage disposal plant site, a letter was read from Dr. A. E. Berry of the Ontario Water Resources Commission.

Mr. Berry's letter said that the commission will do all in its power to see that the plant is completed at the least possible cost; that no decision has been made on any change in the access road and that this, with any other major changes in plan would be brought to council's attention.
