Ian Fleming was chosen as his replacement by the St. John's United Church congregation. He was formerly at Cherry Valley near Peterborough. Because of the lack of congregation, St. Andrews, called its first resident minister from Watford, Rev. Edward Madden. Since the church was built a year ago, Rev. Charles Donald of Oakville had served as minister there. Grace Baptist Church also has a new minister, Rev. Bruce Woods, succeeding Rev. Bruce Penny in the pastorate. Plans are underway for a new church building.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Check Budget Costs Before Further Memorial Park Work

Further work on the new memorial park was delayed a week when Cr. Hunter, who is council's property chairman, expressed fears at Monday's meeting that a suggested \$800 expenditure might put him over budget.

A discussion followed a Harri son-Kelly motion to spend \$500 on sodding, \$200 to complete a water overflow weir and \$100 for rockery stone and flagstone at the cenotaph base.

While none of the council members questioned the need for the park or the need for further improvements, others joined Cr. Hunter in wanting a budget review before committing themselves to further expense.

Cr. Harrison claimed that contemplated sale of municipal property would release extra funds for the project and Cr. Kelly said that it is probable an extra road subsidy not included in the budget would help defray the expense. An erosion problem was pointed out if the pond bank is not pegged with stone.

Cr. Cass asked for a week's delay in voting, and he said he would not favour the plan unless the budget will allow it.

The Moore Park area will change from agricultural to a mixture of commercial, industrial and residential. A small portion of King and Emery Streets will change from industrial to residential. A strip of land fronting John St. E. will change from agricultural to residential.

Plan \$35,000 Edifice Seek Solution As Garbage Fires Irk Town Residents

Complaints of burning rubish, debris and scattered glass were renewed by Cr. John Ellett when he urged improvements in the town's garbage system at Monday's council meeting.

This time engineer G. R. Bush explained that the fire had been deliberately set in industrial waste which had been dumped at the landfill site late Saturday. It was extinguished with a bulldozer Sunday morning.

Mr. Bush had written a second letter to the garbage contractor, saying that a great share of the trouble lies in uncontrolled dumping by private citizens and suggested steps be taken to limit access to the site.

Cr. Harrison explained how difficult it is to control. "If the gate is locked, you find garbage dumped outside the gate," he said.

Cr. Harrison said he wouldn't want to stop dumping at reasonable hours but that there should be some restrictions as the contractor cannot be expected to keep a 24 hour control.

It's a problem that has to be solved. A fire every week and not making up too quickly," he said.
