

Plan New District School For Retarded Children

The North Halton Association for Retarded Children are now planning a new school to serve Georgetown, Acton, Milton, and surrounding districts.

Representatives of the Association from all areas have agreed one good school centrally located to serve all three towns and areas would be an ideal arrangement. The property committee is at the moment looking for a building site in the Hornby - Ashgrove area on the seventh line, or in the Speyside area on Highway 25, to build the new school.

Representing Georgetown: Mr. Andrew Miller, Tel. No. TIL 7-2634 and representing Milton, Mr. G. Addison, TR 8-0558 are anxious to contact property

owners in these areas who may be willing to donate or sell a suitable site of one or two acres.

The Sunshine School in Milton opened a class for Retarded Children in October 1955, in the Firemen's Room at the Town Hall of Milton. Equipment was supplied and three pupils started classes. On Nov. 14, 1956, the school had increased to six pupils and began moving to the basement of the Emmanuel Baptist Church where it remained until June of 1957.

The next move in September 1959, located the present quarters opposite the Milton Arena. At the present time there are 16 pupils, and after the mod-

est support of the public last year, under the auspices of the Georgetown and Milton Kinsmen and all Women's Institutes, it is felt the time has come to pick a site and eventually build a new school for these little people with sufficient room for the children to have a playground; the boy's workshop; a domestic science room for the girls; and enough room for the children to have their music and rhythm classes, without being cramped which is now the case.

An association spokesman said we must not ignore the need of the retarded child. We should reach out a helping hand to these, the least fortunate of all our children.

Expect Eighteen Schools Adopt Driver Education

At the end of the school year there were 47 high schools in Ontario offering extra-curricular course in driver education. The number has doubled in the last two years, and another 18 schools are expected to introduce driver education in September. Toronto and Hamilton are not included in the cities where the course is available.

Safety workers and insurance companies know that the expectancy of death or injury is substantially reduced for every graduate of driver education. The Ontario Safety League has been actively promoting it for many years — recently with the assistance of a grant from the All Canada Insurance Federation.

A two-week course of teacher preparation for high school teachers was conducted by the League in the first half of July. Twenty teachers from across the province qualified to instruct in driver education.

At the graduation luncheon

George H. Jackson, a vice president of the Ford Motor Co. of Canada, and a past president of the Ontario Safety League, included these comments in his address to the teachers:

"It is fine, encouraging news that driver education is increasing in Ontario. But the number of schools offering the course is still tragically small. To me it is a real tragedy that, here we have the means of saving lives and avoiding injuries and yet, as a province and as a nation, we seem reluctant to use those means.

"Some educators have a genuine conviction that the subject has no place in a school program — even if it is extra-curricular. But in the main those who keep the doors closed to driver education do so to be sure, simply for reasons of expediency, or convenience, or short-term economy.

"With these people, I admit I have little patience. In my opinion human life and health — which can be squandered so easily and so recklessly by an untrained hand on the wheel, or an unexplained fault on the accelerator — the cost of which are too precious to be squandered to save a few dollars or to avoid inconvenience.

"If we allow our drivers to get out on the highways with two or three hundred horsepower under their control, untrained and mentally unstable,

Milton High School Deficit Presents Complicated Problem

A deficit of \$24,517.89 incurred by the Milton District High School Board in selling the debentures for the new Milton High School is presenting a complicated problem.

Milton has asked county council to issue a debenture to cover it with the five municipalities, Milton, Acton, Georgetown, Esquimaux and New Weymouth to share the cost.

However, the complication develops in that the Milton High School was financed while Milton was a member of the now extinct North Halton District High School Board.

Effective the first of this year, three separate area boards were established. Milton District, Acton district and Georgetown district and each own their assets in its own area but continue to pay their share of the liabilities.

The board secretary, E. J. ... to discuss the matter

of a commitment of each municipality to be a part of the whole North Halton area. This was to be reconsidered every five years, in case the picture changed radically.

According to Milton District High School Board the deficit was incurred by having to sell the debentures on a half market. Part of the debenture was sold in Canada at \$925 and part in the United States at \$91.

Since county council issued the original debenture, Milton has a bad time to issue another to cover the deficit.

The other four municipalities of Georgetown, Acton, Esquimaux and New Weymouth seem to have some doubts about their responsibility in sharing the Milton district with each own their assets in its own area but continue to pay their share of the liabilities.
