Mrs. Hills was born in New Toronto and had lived in Tillsonburg, Toronto, Georgetown, Brampton and Oakville. She was the daughter of the late William Edward Carter, Saskatchewan and Mrs. Violet Catling of Toronto.

They are survived by their husband and father, Wesley Hills who is in Norfolk Hospital, Smore, suffering from internal injuries suffered in the same accident and four sons and brothers: Stephen, Stanley, William and Christopher. Mrs. Hills' mother Mrs. Violet Catling of Toronto also survives and one brother, William Carter of Willowdale.

Says Tax Payments Should Be Extended To Mid-Month

A strong appeal for due date for tax payments to be extended to mid-month was made by a ratepayer Monday when Mrs. John Cordaro brought her problem to council.

"When income is dependent on rentals it is impossible to have money on the first of a month for taxes," she pleaded. "Saying she has paid over \$2,000 in taxes since the first of the year, Mrs. Cordaro said she wants no favours, but thinks many ratepayers are in the same position."

"I had to borrow some of the tax money, and it hurts when you go to pay and find out you owe a penalty, also," she continued.

(A penalty of 1/4 of 1% is charged under a local by-law if payments are not made on the three dates, June 1st, August 1st and October 1st.)

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Mrs. Cordaro said that when she paid her taxes a few days previously it was the first time she had ever been charged the penalty.

"Even in depression days we had a council that was 'human' and we didn't have penalties added then," she said.

Mayor Hyde explained that the tax by-law has been in effect for many years and that council could give no concession on penalties. He suggested that she consult the tax collector, as the matter came within his jurisdiction.

Claiming moving of heavy machinery could damage newly-surfaced Edward St., James Baillie said the town should check contractors who might wreck the road.

Town engineer Bligh said he had checked and the equipment in question was "padded" and conformed with regulations. However, he had also warned contractors that they would be liable if any damage is done to roads.

"I'm in favour of the lift station but not at that price," said Cr. Wm. F. Hunter who thinks \$47,000 would be more like it. He voted against the approval motion for \$52,000.

Deputy Mayor S. J. D. said that no work can be started until an agreement is drawn up between council and OWRB, and that any points of worry can be ironed out at that time.
