CNE Arcade Of Lights Brightest In The World

Silvers, Borge Star In Grandstand Show

The 1960 Canadian National Exhibition will be the brightest in the 82 year history of the world's largest annual exposition.

It has been customary to speak of each year's exhibition as bigger and better than ever. But this year, for the first time, the adjective, brightest, may be used.

The brightness will be provided by a bank of electric lights on Princess' Blvd., between the Electrical and Automobile Buildings, forming an Arcade of Lights which will make this area the brightest lighted outdoor area in the world.

The special lighting will provide an intensity of 60 foot candles, more than twice as bright as State Street in Chicago, previously claimant to the brightest lighted area on earth. Some idea of the brightness may be obtained when one compares it with a normal home living room, where light intensity is usually about 15 foot candles.

But brightness of itself would have no significance if there wasn't something to show. And this year's CNE will probably have more and better sights and sounds than any in history.

Expressing himself as against angle parking on Main Street, Cr. Ian Cass at a recent council meeting said only 8 to 10 parking spaces would be sacrificed if the west side of the street was converted to parallel parking.

The idea ties in with future plans for reconstruction of Main St. according to Mayor Hyde, who intimated there is a possibility that angle parking would not be necessary. At present there are areas where the sidewalk is so much higher than the road that it is impossible to exit from a car on the sidewalk side of a parallel parked car.

"Have we a by-law stopping merchants from placing their wares on the sidewalks?" queried Cr. Fred Harrison, who said jokingly that some merchants seem to have more goods outside than they have on their shelves.

Mayor Hyde said he knows of no such prohibition.

"If we don't need our sidewalks to walk on, let's make them narrower and have more roadway," was Cr. Harrison's opinion.

The question will be further discussed when police chairman John D. Kelly presents a committee report at a future council meeting.

Expect Highway No. 7 Traffic Decrease, Switch To 401

A drop in the volume of traffic on No. 7 highway through town may be evident when an interchange now under construction where Highway 6 crosses highway 401 just south of Guilph is completed shortly.

The connection will provide a direct route to the metropolitan area from Guilph and points west, and should have an effect on reducing traffic flow on Guilph St. and Main St. north of Guilph. It is known as the Georgetown's boundary.

Great machines are making the road bed for the super highway under the bridge that carries Highway 6 traffic over the four lane speedway. This section was left to the last in the stretch of road between the Milton district connection between 401 and Highway 25 and the Poshm Lake Road near the western border of Wellington county.

The road bed has actually been laid on the southern double lane artery under the Highway 6 overpass. Now the northern double lane section is being graded, rolled and gravelled and should be completed shortly.

WHY COUNCIL DID

Discuss Possibility Of Dropping Main Street Angle Parking

Expressing himself as against angle parking on Main Street, Cr. Ian Cass at a recent council meeting said only 8 to 10 parking spaces would be sacrificed if the west side of the street was converted to parallel parking.

The idea ties in with future plans for reconstruction of Main St. according to Mayor Hyde, who intimated there is a possibility that angle parking would not be necessary. At present there are areas where the sidewalk is so much higher than the road that it is impossible to exit from a car on the sidewalk side of a parallel parked car.

"Have we a by-law stopping merchants from placing their wares on the sidewalks?" queried Cr. Fred Harrison, who said jokingly that some merchants seem to have more goods outside than they have on their shelves.

Mayor Hyde said he knows of no such prohibition.

"If we don't need our sidewalks to walk on, let's make them narrower and have more roadway," was Cr. Harrison's opinion.

The question will be further discussed when police chairman John D. Kelly presents a committee report at a future council meeting.

Expect Highway No. 7 Traffic Decrease, Switch To 401

A drop in the volume of traffic on No. 7 highway through town may be evident when an interchange now under construction where Highway 6 crosses highway 401 just south of Guilph is completed shortly.

The connection will provide a direct route to the metropolitan area from Guilph and points west, and should have an effect on reducing traffic flow on Guilph St. and Main St. north of Guilph. It is known as the Georgetown's boundary.

Great machines are making the road bed for the super highway under the bridge that carries Highway 6 traffic over the four lane speedway. This section was left to the last in the stretch of road between the Milton district connection between 401 and Highway 25 and the Poshm Lake Road near the western border of Wellington county.

The road bed has actually been laid on the southern double lane artery under the Highway 6 overpass. Now the northern double lane section is being graded, rolled and gravelled and should be completed shortly.
