CNE Arcade Of Lights Brightest In The World

Silvers, Borge Star In Grandstand Show

The 1960 Canadian National Exhibition will be the brightest in the 82 year history of the world's largest annual exposition.

It has been customary to speak of each year's exhibition as Bigger and Better than ever. But this year, for the first time, the adjective, Bright or, may be used.

The brightness will be provided by a bank of electric lights on Prince's Blvd. between the Electrical and Automotive Buildings, forming an Arcade of Lights which will make this area the brightest lighted outdoor area in the world.

The special lighting will provide an intensity of 60 foot candles, more than twice as bright as State Street in Chicago, previously claimed to be the brightest lighted area on earth. Some idea of the brightness may be obtained when one compares it with a normal home living room, where light intensity is usually about 15 foot candles.

Brightness of itself would have no significance if there wasn't something to show. And this year's CNE will probably have more and better sights and sounds than any in history.

On the Evening Grandstand there will be two big name headliners on succeeding weeks. Phil Silvers, radio, TV and movie star, and his company from the TV show "Get Billo," will occupy the spotlight during the period August 26th to September 2nd. Joe Vickers, well known Canadian tenor, will be a second headline attraction for that week.

Warriors' Day Parade, August 27, is one of the most colorful of the many parades that are held during the exhibition. Thousands of veterans and about 50 bands will take part in the annual feature of the first Saturday.

The Canadian National Exhibition is co-operating in observing the 100th anniversary of the Hereford cattle in Canada with a special competition for these cattle on Farmers' and Livestock Day, September 7.

A prize list of \$20,000 has been appropriated for this class - the largest amount of money ever given for one class in Canada.

The Canadian Armed Forces will have an attractive new display this year. It will be housed under a new type of Geodesic Dome which will be an unusual attraction in itself. The United States Navy Band under the direction of Cmdr. Charles Brendler, will be the featured band on the exhibition Bandshell. This band of 80 members is one of the finest

in the world.

Discuss Possibility Of Dropping Main Street Angle Parking

Expect Highway No. 7 Traffic Decrease, Switch To 401
